College crowd to hear Norton group

The Norton Community High School chorus will be stepping up a couple of notches when they sing the national anthem at Gross Memorial Coliseum on the campus of Fort Hays State University on Friday, Dec. 5.



Dan and Sue Skrdlant, Norton County, were honored as Kansas Farm Bureau Farm Family of the Year for Farm Bureau's 10th geographic district of northwest Kansas. The Skrdlants received their award during Kansas Farm Bureau's 90th annual meeting in Manhattan on Nov. 8.

One family in each of the Kansas Farm Bureau's 10 geographic districts is selected each year for the Farm Family of the Year award. The award recognizes families for their service and leadership in agriculture, Farm Bureau and their communities.

The Skrdlants have two children, Katelyn, 7, and Colby, 3. Mrs. Skrdlant home-schools both children.

Patsy Maddy, county coordinator for the Norton County Farm Bureau Association, encouraged the Skrdlants to fill out the forms to enter the contest.

"They are really active in the community and in Farm Bureau, and I thought they had a really good chance of getting it," said Mrs. Maddy.

"It was a very long and detailed application, but I'm glad we did it. We never thought we would get it," said Mrs. Skrdlant "The day before we got the letter in the mail telling us we were chosen, we had found out we're going to be having a baby!"

The Skrdlants are especially active in their county Farm Bureau. They have

each held a wide range of leadership positions in the Norton County Farm Bureau, including serving in officer positions and as key committee chairpersons. Together, Mr. and Mrs. Skrdlant have co-chaired their county Young Farmer and Rancher Committee and have lobbied in Washington, D.C. on behalf of Farm Bureau-member driven policy. They have held leadership positions on the statewide Young Farmer and Rancher Committee and Mr. Skrdlant currently serves on the Kansas Farm Bureau Feed Grains Advisory Committee.
