# Lady Blue Jays limit Oberlin to 25 points

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Kevin Jilka's Norton Community High School girls basketball team started the new year with an impressive 62-25 win over Oberlin on Tuesday evening in the NCHS Stull Gymnasium.

Despite an original schedule that would have seen the Lady Jays play at home twice already, it was Norton's first home game of the season. A season-opening contest with Atwood was changed from Norton to Atwood and a home contest with Phillipsburg was postponed until February 12 due to inclement weather.

Needless to say, the home fans were delighted to see the Lady Jays of the Mid-Continent League dominate the Lady Red Devils from the Northwest Kansas

Norton shot well and played aggressively on defense in a contest where the second half mirrored the first half in points scored by both teams. Norton led by quarters 17-6, 31-13 and 46-19.

"It was nice to finally play at home," said coach Jilka. "I was proud of the way our girls played.

"Defensively, we were solid all night. Offensively, we moved the ball well. We played hard for 32 minutes and executed well in all phases of the game.

"We got a slow start in the third quarter offensively but continued to play good defense and they didn't catch up. Then, we got an offensive spurt to give us a good lead going into the fourth quarter."

In Norton's 17-point first period, Lacey Wallingford and Hayli Bozarth each hit two baskets, Bozarth hit two free throws and Wallingford one charity toss. Taylor Rossi, Katharine Roy and Amanda Ray also each hit a basket.

In the second quarter, the Lady Jays totaled 14 more points on two baskets each by Wallingford and Laura Lee Baird, field goals by KaraJo Jones and Amanda Ray and two charity tosses by Hayli Bozarth.

third quarter when she buried three followed by Rossi, Roy, 3 each; three-point baskets, a two-pointer and two free throws for 13 of the Lady Jays' 15 points. Bozarth added two free tosses.

Norton tallied 16 more points in the fourth quarter on three baskets by Bozarth, two by Wallingford, a basket by Ray, a trey by Ashlie Stewart and free throw by Jones.

Baird ended with 17 points on 3 of 9 from beyond the arc for 33 percent, 3 of 10 two-point tries for 30 percent and 6 of 19 overall for 32 percent. She was a perfect 2 of 2 from the free throw line.

Bozarth tallied 16 points on 5 of 9 from the field for 56 percent and a perfect 6 of 6 charity tosses. Wallingford was Norton's third double figure scorer with 13 points on 6 of 10 from two-point range for 60 percent. She missed all three trey tries and ended with 6 of 13 overall for 46 percent. She hit her only free throw.

Leading scorer for Oberlin was Jordan Dreher with 8 points.

As a team, Norton hit 4 of 17 three-point tries for 24 percent, 20 of 43 two-point attempts for 47 percent and 24 of 60 overall for 40 percent. Oberlin hit 8 of 28 twopoint tries for 29 percent and took no shots from long range.

From the charity stripe, the Lady Jays connected on 10 of 15 for 67 percent while the Lady Red Devils hit 9 of 17 charities for 53

Norton outrebounded Oberlin 21-19. The Lady Jays pulled down 8 offensive and 13 defensive boards compared to 7 offensive and 12 defensive by the Lady Red

Wallingford and Roy each grabbed 5 caroms, followed by Jones, 4; Stewart, 3; Bozarth, 2; Baird, Ray, 1 each.

The Blue Jays led 6-5 after one quarter and 18-12 at intermission. A 21-13 third quarter in Oberlin's favor allowed the Red Devils to take a slim 33-31 lead.

Norton's Landon Hamel, who led all scorers with 21 points, scored early in the fourth period to tie the score at 33-all and the score was tied again at 35-all before Oberlin went on a 15-4 run to take a 50-39 advantage with 3:14

remaining in the game. The Blue Jays would not give up and continued to battle the Red Devils the rest of the way. Norton outscored the visitors 8-2 in the final minutes but couldn't quite

close the gap. Hamel hit two baskets and two free throws and Luke Ninemire swished a basket in the final minutes. Hamel's final basket came when he grabbed the ball and dribbled the entire length of the court for a layup that made it 50-47 with 10 seconds remaining. Two Oberlin free throws by Logan

Fortin made the final 52-47. Both teams hit 21 field goals in the game and Norton actually outscored Oberlin by 1 point on field goals since the Jays hit one more three-point shot than the Red Devils. Oberlin's additional points came on 9 free throws compared to 3 for Norton.

"I was pleased with our effort. We played hard the whole game," said Norton coach Reusink.

"We aren't playing very intelligently and not keeping our Devils.
