Winter winds returned to northwest Kansas Monday and reports from around the area had gusts ranging from 58-61 miles per-hour with sustained winds in the low to mid-40 mile per-hour range. Forecasts were for wind warnings in much of Nebraska and a good portion of Kansas. In Norton there wasn't any immediate damage reported from winds that were of sufficient force to inflict damage. Some streets were littered with trash cans and other kinds of debris, easily moved by the force of the winds. The winds were expected to taper off last night.

Boy had good reason for letting hair grow

Ty Burns, 13, isn't afraid to be different. And, if his "difference" helps someone else — so much the better.

About two years ago, Ty's mother, Amanda Burns, was diagnosed with cancer. After treatment, she no longer has any symptoms of the disease, but Ty was moved to do something.

He decided to grow out his blonde hair and donate it to Locks of Love, an agency that makes wigs for children who have lost their hair during cancer

treatment.

Ty said when he first started growing out his hair some of the kids at school gave him a bad time. He didn't tell anyone why he was doing it, but he didn't let their teasing bother him either.

His mother said she wanted Ty's donation to be publicized in hopes other youngsters might be inspired to do the same.

Saturday, Ty had an appointment with Elicia Wicker, a hair stylist at E11even. After pulling Ty's hair back, she carefully measured to make sure he had the required

10 inches of hair needed for a donation. Ms. Wicker said, "I've cut lots of girl's hair for Locks of Love, but Ty is the first boy's I've cut."

As Ty climbed into the stylist's chair, his mother said, "I think I'm more nervous than he is."

Ty's dad, Trevor Burns, was also present for moral support. Mr. Burns had nothing but praise for his son. He said, "I'm really proud of him — he's a good kid. (By donating his hair) he's giving back a little bit."

A few snips of the scissors and it was

done. Ms. Wicker held Ty's hair out for him to see. After feeling the hair left on his head, all he could say was, "Boy, it's really short."

The oldest of the Burns' four children, Ty is a seventh grader at Norton Junior High School where he plays basketball for the Blue Jays.

His outside interests include playing drums and anything rock 'n roll.

When asked what he thought about donating his hair, Ty said, "I just might do it again."

Good boy!

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Space needs seen as reason for new facility

Norton County is hoping to get a new Emergency Medical Services building sometime in the next year.

According to Norton County Clerk Robert Wyatt, the current building, located at 809 North Norton, is made of corrugated metal and was built in 1977 with two garage bays, when station wagons and vans were used, which were much smaller than the box-style units used today. It is 2,000 square feet and used a completely volunteer staff.

There are now five full-time Emergency Medical Services employees and 12 part-time on-call employees.

"The main issue with the current building is the lack of space," said Mr. Wyatt. "They need space for training, record keeping, offices, sleeping quarters for the on-call staff and a decontamination unit. The new building will also be handicapped-accessible and have a basement for storage and to use as a storm shelter."

According to Amy Griffey, of the Northwest Kansas Planning and Development Commission, the new building will be more than double the size of the current building, with 4,420 square feet, four bays for ambulance units, decontamination facilities, a meeting/classroom, efficient office space and storage to meet Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act compliance, overnight space for staff and volunteers, a kitchenette and easily accessible restrooms.

Northwest Kansas Development and Planning will administer the grant funds

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
