

The Norton School Board accepted the resignations of five faculty members Monday evening. They were Dale Engelbert, Norton Community High School math teacher; George Rossi, junior high head football coach; Thomas Hehn, high school cross-country coach; Mariane Wicker, head high school tennis coach; and Danielle LeClair, assistant high

school cheerleader coach. Mr. Engelbert is retiring after 37 years of service, 35 of which were in Norton. "We wish Mr. Engelbert only the best in his retirement," said Norton Schools Superintendent Greg Mann. "Thirty-five years is a long time to do anything in the same place! Mr. Engelbert has been a steadying influence in our district; he has always been a forward thinking person who was not reluctant to try new things and adapt to new methods and practices; at the same time he has been an important link to our school district's past.'
