# Book signing to kick off celebration

bleroux@nwkansas.com Nancy Pickard, an author and Kansas native, will hold a book signing on March 6 at 5 p.m. at the Norton Public Library to kick off the library's 100th Year celebration.

Ms. Pickard splits her time between Prairie Village and Florida. She has written fiction mysteries and crime novels, to include the Jenny Crain and Marie Lightfoot mystery series.

She also co-authored a nonfiction book, Seven Steps on the Writer's Path, which brought this comment from best selling author Sue Grafton: "I can give

you seven reasons to buy this book for every writer you know. It's fresh, insightful, candid, funny, supportive, encouraging and wise.

She has won several awards for her books, including the Agatha, Anthony, Macavity and Shamus Awards, and has had several major critics write positive reviews of her books.

Ms. Pickard's latest book, The Virgin of Small Plains, was chosen as the Book of the Year for the 2009 Kansas Reads Program, sponsored by the Kansas Center for the Book. It combines classic mystery writing with a literary novel. It

is set in a fictional small town in the Flint Hills and explores themes of love, loss, secrets and lies, friendship and community, in a tale about the murder of a young girl and the efforts of a group of friends to expose who she was and what really happened to her.

Ms. Pickard will speak about her life as an author and about her books.
