

Happy, healthy, lucky first-grader

On Sunday, Nov. 23, Dawson was playing outside at the Norcatur home of his grandparents, Dean and June Forbes. Dawson jumped from atop a pile of bricks and landed on a piece of rebar jutting out of the ground.

Without even knowing it, he was impaled through his chin and into his mouth, knocking out his two front teeth.

Dawson said, "I didn't even feel it happen."

Calls to 911 brought immediate help. The fast action of Norcatur firemen, C.W. Lyon and Troy Wentz, solved the immediate problem - cutting the rebar so Dawson could be transported.

He was taken by Decatur County ambulance, with the rebar still in his neck and mouth, to meet the Flight for Life helicopter sent from Good Samaritan Hospital in Kearney.

It landed on the paved highway connecting Norcatur to Highway 36.

Dawson said even though the helicopter ride was fun, he was a little scared. His mom, Shelby Forbes, couldn't ride with him as there was only room on board for the crew.

Dawson remained awake and alert during the flight to Kearney.


## Two students receive scholarships
