Disease showing up in pine trees Pine wilt disease may end the wilt is one reason the disease has

era when Scots pines can usually survive in Kansas. The alwayslethal problem has shown up in the state's Austrian and white pines, too.

"Pine wilt has made real inroads since it first appeared in southwest Kansas 30 years ago. For awhile, it seemed confined to the eastern third of the state. But, now it's well past that and moving into the west. And, the only real control is still to remove infected trees before they can spread the disease to others,' said Ward Upham Kansas State University Research and Extension horticulturist.

By April 1, even the stump should be gone and all the wood burned, chipped or buried.

"That's the only way to prevent further spread of the pinewood nematode, which causes the problem, as well as the nematode's transportation from tree to tree — the pine sawyer beetle," Mr. Upham said.

Difficulty in recognizing pine

spread so easily, he said. No pines are native to the state. Transplants don't always thrive, and that can cause similar symptoms. Pine insects, fungal diseases and environmental stresses can all cause needles to yellow and die.

A major difference with pine wilt is that it generally causes a

tree to wilt and die rather rapidly - often within a few months and usually in less than a year, he said. The disease may affect a branch at a time or show up everywhere in the tree at the same time. Either way, the result is brown needles that hang on for six to 12 months, plus brittle, easily broken branches and twigs.


