gun team qualifies for Internationals

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team proved the power of persistence on Saturday in the 14th annual State 4-H Shooting Match in Alma when they earned third place to qualify on their second try for the International BB Gun Championships in Bowling Green, Kentucky.

The first time, they were the third best shooting team in the 44th annual State BB Gun Championships hosted by the Kansas Rifle Association on March 14, which was also held in Alma; however, Norton County's written test dropped them to fourth overall.

Since only the top three teams from the Kansas Rifle Association sponsored shoot qualify for the international competition, the Norton County team was in danger of not qualifying for one of the few times in history.

So, the young marksmen went back to work the past month when they only had to concentrate on shooting since the 4-H shoot has no written test.

Record number of shooters

Saturday's shoot attracted a record 168 girl and boy marksmen so finishing in the top three teams was far from a cakewalk for the Norton team, who qualified to compete for the state title by winning the championship of the Northwest Kansas Regional 4-H Shooting Sports Match on February 28 in Oakley.

Battling some of the same teams they competed against in the earlier state shoot, Norton improved their earlier score by 18 points and finished behind the same champion and runner-up. Pottawatomie/Riley County was the champion with a total shooting score of 1814, followed by Wyandotte County, 1808; Norton County, 1785; Phillips/Rooks County, 1740; Jefferson County, 1736; Wabaunsee County, 1716 and Jackson County, 1714 in the top seven.

A different format is used in the 4-H shoot. Shooters are divided into junior shooters ages 9-11 and senior shooters ages 12-14. Team members can be from any age group but awards are given for individuals in both age groups.

Also, each marksman has only kneeling positions one right after with a 90. the other.

but the breakdown shows that 93 in sitting.

Norton placed second behind Pottawatomie/Riley County in prone firing with a 467 compared to their 477. Wyandotte was third in prone with a 465.

In the standing position, the toughest of the four, Norton finished third with a 418. Wyandotte won that position with a 432, followed by Jefferson County, who was just one point ahead of Norton at 419. Eventual champion Pottawatomie/Riley County was fourth in standing, just one point behind Norton.

Norton County defeated all other teams in firing from the sitting position with an outstanding 466. Wyandotte was second with a 463, Phillips/Rooks County third with a 461 and Pottawatomie/Riley County fourth with a 457.

At that point, with only the kneeling firing remaining, Pottawatomie/Riley County, despite a fourth place in sitting, still held a slim overall lead with 1361 points. Wyandotte was just one point behind at 1360 and Norton was third, just nine more points behind at 1351 and still very much in the race for the championship.

Firing from the kneeling position was not as good as was hoped for the Norton marksmen, however, and they were unable to challenge for the championship. Pottawatomie/Riley County pulled away with a 463 in kneeling, compared to a 448 by Wyandotte County and 434 by Norton County for the third best kneeling score and final standing of third.


Norton's five-shooter team consisted of Kaitlyn Campbell, 14; David Smith, 13; Gabriel Bird, 13; Zachary Bird, 13 and James Berry, 10. Alternates were Dalton Vanover, 11 and Trenton Sprague, 10.

Lane Archer, 13 and Erin Archer, 11, former Norton BB Gun Team marksmen who are not eligible for team competition this year, shot for individual honors and did very well.

Individual awards

Berry, Sprague and Erin Archer were listed as junior shooters and all had exceptional scores. Berry shot a 367 total score to receive the medal for second high overall aggregate! He also won medals for each individual position. He was one appearance on the firing line second in prone with a 95, third in the prone, standing, sitting and with an 88 and fourth in kneeling

In the senior division, Lane Archer was third high aggregate


He also received a medal for being second high in standing with a 90 and a medal for being third high in kneeling with a 94. Lane also shot a 97 in prone and 95 in sitting.

Relays in Lawrence and demonstrated that they can run and throw with the best of them!
