Tun on the farm



Norton lands project

Million plus for Natoma Corp.

USDA Rural Development Acting State Director Darla Buckman told The Norton Telegram that Rural Telephone Service Company, Inc. of Lenora was selected to receive a loan from the USDA Rural Economic Development Loan & Grant Program. Upon receipt of the loan proceeds, following execution of loan documentation and meeting the conditions of the program, the cooperative will then pass the loan proceeds on to the local

applicant to finance job creation efforts. She said such funds can be used for a variety of purposes, including community facilities and infrastructure, improving access to local medical care and other projects that encourage a favorable climate for job creation and economic

The Rural Telephone Service Company, Inc. project will receive a loan of \$740,000 to assist in the construction of an addition to an existing business in Norton. Agency funds will be leveraged with an owner contribution of \$775,427. Total project cost will be \$1,515,427 and create six new jobs.

The loan to be distributed locally will go to the Natoma Corporation, said Rural Telephone's CEO Larry Sevier. "We are happy to be the conduit for Natoma"s USDA loan," he said.

The loan carries zero percent interest rate because it is for economic develop-
