Quickest way to find out the status of your refund is to go to Google.com and when it comes up type in Kansas Refund Status, click on the Google Search box and within seconds it comes up. Follow the very brief instructions to learn your status. That's it. I've been doing that for many, many weeks.

I bet the state will make sure every refund is in the mail before July 1.


