Agency office gives election refresher course

Voting

Since Farm Service Agency County Committee elections happen only once a year, here is an election refresher. For election purposes, counties are divided into local administrative areas, or LAAs. Each area selects one producer to serve a three-year term on the Farm Service Agency county committee.

Each year, an election is held in a local administrative area to replace the committee member whose three-year term is expiring. In counties with three such areas, one seat is up for election. In combined counties in some years, two seats may be up for election.

Nominations

Candidate nominations for the Farm Service Agency county committee election will be accepted through Aug. 3.

Producers who are residents

in the local administrative area holding the election and who participate or cooperate in a Farm Service Agency program and are of legal voting age, may be nominated to serve on the county committee.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Also, organizations representing socially disadvantaged minorities and women farmers or ranchers may also nominate candidates.

The nomination form, FSA-669A, is available at the county Farm Service Agency office.

To be valid, the nomination form must be signed by the person being nominated, indicating agreement to serve if elected. The completed nomination form must be returned to the county office by the close of business on Aug. 3, or postmarked by midnight Aug. 3.

Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters beginning Nov. 6 and must be returned to the county office by the close of business on Dec. 7, or postmarked by midnight Dec. 7.

Agricultural producers of legal voting age can vote if they participate or cooperate in any Farm Service Agency program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations on an entire farm can also vote.

No one can be denied the right to vote because of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation or marital or family status.

Candidate Eligibility

To hold office as a county committee member, a person must meet the basic eligibility crite-

ria:

 $\sqrt{Participate}$ or cooperate in a program administered by the Farm Service Agency

 \sqrt{Be} eligible to vote in a county committee election

 $\sqrt{\text{Reside in the local administra-}}$ tive area in which the person is a \$75. candidate

 \sqrt{Not} have been:

1. Removed or disqualified from the office of county committee member, alternate or employee

2. Removed for cause from any public office or have been convicted of fraud, larceny, embezzlement or any other felony

3. Dishonorably discharged from any branch of the armed services.
