Indoor swimming pool discussed at city meeting

The Frontier Community Foundation presented its indoor swim pool project to the Norton City Council Wednesday evening. Norton County Commissioner Carolyn Applegate said, in an interview Thursday morning, that the foundation has been researching the idea of an indoor pool for three years. A location has yet to be determined.

The board of trustees include Scott Sproul, Mrs. Applegate, Amy Griffey, Doug Ray, Larry Enfield Sr., Mary Jane Meyer and Kim Wicker. The advisory board was made up of Diane Becker, Kip Johnson and Brandi Lyn Seamon.

The foundation presented their proposal on Monday to the Parks and Recreation Committee, and to the city council and hospital board on Wednesday.

Joe Leroux, city council member, said the plans are in the preliminary phases, and the city is looking at how they will be able to afford the pool.

The pool would incur a lot of expense. Construction, maintenance, staff and utilities would be very costly to the city, he said.

"By no means do we think this is a bad idea. We're just trying to figure out how to pay for it," Mr. Leroux said.

Mr. Leroux stressed that this is a community pool and it would be paid for with community money.

"This is their money, this is their community. We want to hear their input," he

Mrs. Applegate said the foundation is researching grants and endowments to help support the pool after it is constructed. She also said an endowment is being set up to help run the pool. The Legacy Endowment will be set up to receive grants and donations.

"We're not grant writers, but we're grant seekers," Mrs. Applegate said.

Research done shows 196 foundations with endowments that could give money for the pool and 1,000 endowments that could help support some of the operating

A new pool would provide several benefits to the community, despite the costs, it was pointed out.

Benefits would include saving money on insurance through a wellness plan, physical activity would decrease childhood obesity, quality of life would increase, a year-round program for the hospital's water aerobics program and it would be a safe place for youth and sports teams to train.

Healthcare a local concern

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There are 665 people in Norton County who are uninsured, and the national debate about universal healthcare has left many to wonder how many people will be covered if legislation is passed.

Kansas Senator Pat Roberts said a preliminary study found that the Kennedy-Dodd healthcare reform proposal could cause millions of insured Americans to lose their healthcare.

He said the number of people who would lose their insurance through their employer would decline by 15 million, but an estimated 39 million people would be able to obtain coverage.

More details are to be released on the plan in the coming weeks.

Locally, the plan is not fully sup-

"I'm concerned because it's a really hard balance to allow patient choice, which we have now," Gina Frack, Norton $County\,Health\,Department\,administrator$ and registered nurse, said.

Mrs. Frack said she would like to see a medium between allowing patient choice and having more people insured.

Norton County Hospital Director Rich Miller believes healthcare reform is going to happen, and he agreed with Mrs. Frack about their needing to be a medium.

"Access to coverage will happen. How to pay for it will be a challenge,"

Mr. Miller also said healthcare administrators promote healthcare reform because it is needed.
