Collaboration said benefit to two counties

The Norton and Decatur county extension offices will combine to form the Twin Creeks Extension District Number Nine on July 1. The final approval was given at the Norton County commission meeting June 15.

Norton County Extension Agent Keith VanSkike said the agreement has been ongoing since January. The agreement between the county commissions and extension offices, he said, will begin July 1 and will allow the extension office to remain in its current location in the Norton County Courthouse.

Mr. VanSkike told The Norton Telegram that the Decatur office will handle administrative things like bills — but both offices will have individual programs like the fair and 4–H activities.

"We're still going to do lots of things the same. It's not consolidation, it's collaboration," Mr.

VanSkike said.

• A public hearing was held to discuss an application for a type II modular ambulance for the Norton County Emergency Medical Service. The application will be submitted to the Kansas Department of Commerce for the small cities community development block grant recovery act. Vote taken, motion carried.

• Norton County Solid Waste Supervisor Curt Archibald delivered his report and said he checked on the agreement with Solomon Valley E-Waste. He said the coalition has not signed and returned the agreement yet. Mr. Archibald also reported that there have been problems with the recycle collection. He said recycled containers cannot be picked up unless they are marked. Commissioner Carolyn Applegate suggested a notice

be put on bills. Mr. Archibald said he would meet with Norton City Administrator Rob Lawson.

• Reggie Beckman, Norton County Noxious Weed supervisor, gave an update on spraying. He said there are still complaints about flies from landowners with musk thistle even though spraying is continuing. Mr. Beckman also reported that Jeff Vogel with the wildlife park informed him that the park has received a grant to help with noxious weeds. They will be introducing a beetle to help with weed control.

• Norton County Road and Bridge Supervisor Tom Brannan said crews are working in the shop on maintenance projects due to the recent rain. He also presented more information on the signing machine that would allow the county to make its own signs. The cost of the machine is believed to pay for itself within a year.
