The Fourth of July fireworks display was a huge success with a record number of people entering Prairie Dog State Park to view the display Saturday night.

Steve Mathes, park manager, said 1,777 vehicles entered the park on Saturday. Last year 1,639 vehicles entered.

It cost \$4.20 to get in and an estimated \$7,463 in revenue resulted, he said. Mr. Mathes said they estimate three people per car car entered the park, thus an estimated 5,331 watched the display at the site.

The estimate only applied to people entering the park on Saturday, it did not include weekend campers.

Mr. Mathes said the entire park staff worked an excess of eight hours on Saturday. There are three full time staff and six seasonal who worked with traffic control, law enforcement and park permit sales, he said.

"It's a really good program for the area. We had visitors from Kansas, Colorado, Nebraska and Arkansas," Mr. Mathes said.

The DJ for the event was Marvin Matchett, KQNK radio station manager. He said he has served in that capacity for the last six years.

"It's fun. There's nothing more American than this, and there is a great fireworks display to end the night," Mr. Matchett said.

Community members enjoyed the evening's events.

Mike Pollock brought his children in time to watch the display after barbecuing steaks at his home. He said he brings his family most years to see it.

April Fortener had been camping since Thursday. She is from Norton and said she camps every year.

"We always camp on the fourth. It's a family thing," she said.

Bubba Brooks said he came to relax and enjoy the fireworks display. Rich and Dawn Risewick, Jamboree Foods, provided the free watermelon.

"I just like giving watermelon away," Mr. Risewick said.

Mrs. Risewick said they enjoy giving back to the community. They estimated giving away 40 watermelons.

Tennis court repair to begin

Councilman Joe Leroux reported that it would cost at least \$80,000 to replace the court. Repairing would cost substantially less and would make the courts usable for another season.

Dan Bainter, the city's public works supervisor, told The Telegram that the cracks would be sealed and painted to match the rest of the court.
