Bill decided he would try to photograph turkeys while they descended from their roost in the trees, while he didn't get the turkey photo, it wasn't a wasted


Bill took a picture of a beautiful wood duck, and when people expressed an interest in purchasing the picture, Outdoor Images

Fishing Report

Fish have been caught in Leota Cove, along the rocks off the dam, back by the flood gates and in Schoen's Cove.

Walleye/Saugeye-Fair

Fair numbers being caught up by the Marsh Dike, up to the west end and in Leota Cove. Jigs tipped with night crawlers work especially well. On April 20, 600,000 saugeye fry were stocked, and on May 19 66,855 saugeye fingerlings were stocked.

Wiper-Good

Reports of wipers being caught on the east side of Leota Cove, along the dam and in the sandpit by casting bucktails and jigs into the wind and using worms and cut bait on the bottom.

Channel Catfish-Fair

There have been reports of channels being caught off the public fishingdock and up to the west end using sunfish and worms on the bottom.

Crapple-Fair


Reports last week of fish being caught off the marina slips, public fishing dock, over the fish attractors and trolling crankbaits. Most fish were between five to seven inches, but there were some caught between nine and 11 inches.


