Marcia C. Barry March 31, 1932 - July 2, 2009

Marcia Carol Barry died July 2 in Colorado Springs after a brief illness.

Marcia was born on March 31, 1932 in Norton to the late LeRoy and Louela McMahon.

She was a 1950 graduate of St. Mary's High School. In 1954, after graduating from Loretta Heights College with a degree in nursing, she started her career at Penrose Hospital. She went on to teach nursing at Seton School of Nursing and El Paso Community College where she was the coordinator of the practical nursing program.

In 1975 she received her Master of Science in nursing from Colorado University School of Nursing.

She kept active in several local organizations including the American Nurses' Association, Nurses Association of American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, Sigma Theta Tau and the El Paso County Republican Woman's Roundtable.

She was an avid Denver Bronco fan, loved traveling the beautiful state of Colorado with her husband and was instrumental in several campaigns including her own husband's. Marcia was often seen sideline at her grandchildren's sporting events. She will always be remembered with a smile but deeply missed by all who were lucky enough to know her.

In 1955, she married Bernard J. Barry on Sept. 12.

She is survived by her husband and her four children and their families: Jack, Deb and and Murphy Barry, David Barry, Julie (Barry) and Erik Rusin and Di (Barry), Kevin and Caitie Ihle.

She was preceded in death by a sister, Pat Nauman.

A memorial service was held at 10 a.m. on July 9 at St. Mary's Cathedral 2 W Kiowa Street in Colorado Springs.
