Storage facility loan program reauthorized

The 2008 Farm Bill reautho-Farm Storage Facility Loan Program. The program provides lowinterest financing for producers to build or upgrade farm storage and handling facilities.

To expedite the program's approval process, producers planning to submit an application may request an environmental evaluation of their proposed project at their county Farm Service Agency office.

of the National Environmental Policy Act, a Farm Service Agency must evaluate the potential impacts the proposed structure could have on the environment for the program applications. An FSA-850 form must be completed for each application before the application can be approved.

Producers requesting an envirized the Farm Service Agency's ronmental compliance determination are advised that the loan program application must be submitted and approved before site preparation and construction can begin on the facility.

Applicants will be required to identify the:

• type of structure they wish to construct

• proposed site by marking the location on an aerial photo

County Offices will not accept To comply with the provisions requests to complete FSA-850 via telephone. If a producer is unable to visit the office, the request must be submitted in writing and include the necessary information to complete FSA-850.

Salava, acting state crop acres by applicable deadexecutive director for the Kansas lines, maintain production evi-Farm Service Agency, reminds producers that Sept. 1, is the application closing date for certain crops under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program. Crops eligible for these benefits are limited to those not insurable in the county and are produced for food or fiber.

September 1 is the final date to pay the applicable service fee and obtain the program's coverage for Aquaculture, Canola, Christmas Trees, Nursery Crops, Speltz, Turf Grass Sod, and all Small Grain Crops, except Oats. For 2010, Continuous Crop Wheat planted with the intention of harvesting as grain is not eligible for NAP.

The administrative service fee is \$250 per crop per administrative county not to exceed \$750 per producer per administrative county and a \$1875 maximum fee for multi-county producers. Interested producers must pay the fee and file form CCC-471, Application for Coverage, by the application closing deadline.

This coverage entitles eligible producers to a payment of 55 percent of an average market price for the commodity if a natural disaster caused a 50 percent production loss or greater of an eligible crop.

In the unfortunate event that a producer does suffer a loss on their particular crop, a form CCC-576, Notice of Loss, must be filed with Farm Service Agency within 15 calendar days after the disaster occurrence, or the date the loss becomes apparent to the producer.

Producers are limited to \$100,000 in benefits per person per crop year, they must certify



dence for 3 years, have less than \$500,000 Non-farm Adjusted Gross Income, and must comply with conservation compliance provisions in order to be eligible. Interested producers need to contact their local Farm Service Agency at the USDA Service Center prior to the Sept. 1 application closing date to obtain coverage.
