The state has cut education in order to save money in their budget, hurting many rural schools.

"They need to fund schools the way they should be funded for our children," he said.

"There is a lot of opportunity to move our facilities to a more modern, better learning environment," he said.

Mr. Griffith said technology in the schools needs to be upgraded as well.

Currently there are two com-

puter labs at the high school, one lab at the junior high school and one laptop lab at the elementary school.

He said the laptop labs are three years old and the computers in the labs are six years old.

Mr. Griffith said he would like to add computers to the science rooms, which would allow virtual lab work to be done. He said it would be safer for students to learn on a computer.

"I think our students deserve the best, and that is what we want to give them," he said.


