## Train, tractor involved in county accident

A Kyle Railroad train was involved Thursday morning in an accident southwest of Norton with a tractor belonging to the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks. No injuries were sustained, according to officials on the scene, but the tractor was demolished.

Norton County Sheriff Troy Thomson, who is investigating the accident, told The Telegram late Thursday afternoon that the tractor was crossing the railroad tracks at 10:43 a.m. and was struck by the on-coming train.

The train struck the front end of the tractor and spun it off the tracks, causing extensive front-end damage. The train was not damaged.

Bernie Bowen was driving the tractor. This is the second incident in a matter of weeks involving a Kyle train. Early on the morning of Friday, July 24, 15,000 bushels of wheat were deposited on

Mr. Shelton discussed the prison's budget with the board. He said the Kansas Department of Corrections cut its budget by eight percent state-wide which closed the Stockton facility, two vocational programs and most of the general education

# School district prepares for flu outbreak

The H1N1, or swine flu, virus is a big concern at schools all over the country, and the Norton School District Board is taking the necessary steps to prepare for an outbreak.

Superintendent Greg Mann told the board during last Monday's meeting that Norton has had no reports of swine flu yet, but he is taking precautions.

"We will have sanitizer and hand wipes

in place in every classroom. A lot of it is meetings with county health officials of the principals. Policy B604.8 would common sense," he said.
