end of life counseling are more at peace, consider their life in a more positive light and, oddly enough, live longer.*

I don't represent Hospice and I certainly am not the voice of this wonderful group, but what I am is a believer in each life being offered the best death possible. Isn't it amazing we encourage, almost Death can be a frightening thought and each of us approaches it in our own unique way. Most of us would agree one of our greatest fears is that we will suffer. One of the biggest attributes of Hospice for me is the way they are able to control pain until the end. What a wonderful gift to give a dying patient and his/her family. rather it is going to encourage discussion about how we want to live as well as how we want to die, in the same manner that Hospice does. Discussions on outcome are an important part of acceptance, whether that outcome is death or life in a coma. One thing we cannot forget, all of us are terminal. Many of us have living wills, or do not resuscitate orders. This is all part of end of life counseling. We either talked with our doctors, our lawyers or our families, or best with all of these to come to a good death. It helps not only us, but our families as well.

Medicare payment of end of life couneling visits, is likely less costly than one which doesn't carry out the patient's wishes. Health care reform will give us all options. If we have cancer, how much treatment do we want? If we suffer from a painful, debilitating disease to what extreme are we willing to go? It isn't about euthanasia or a death panel.

There are times, more notable in the last couple of years, that Tiger Woods - to me anyway — just doesn't always seem like Tiger Woods. I listen closely to the television analysts for answers when his day might have been less than expected, but their take and mine differ greatly. To me there is a simple explanation. 
I think maybe you (Publisher Tom) and Haynes (Owner Steve) were a little tough on the people concerning government health care.
