Cloyd Eligh Patterson August 30, 1918 - September 15, 2009

Cloyd Eligh Patterson was born the first child of four children to Robert Reuben Patterson and Mrs. Emma Amelia (Shipferling) Patterson on August 30, 1918 at

Antioch on Highway 2, in southwest Sheridan County, Nebraska. He died Tuesday, September 15, 2009 at the Colonial Villa Good Samaritan Center in Alma, Nebraska. His age was 91 years and 15 days. Cloyd moved from

in 1922 and to Alma in 1924. In 1925 the family moved to the Prairie Dog area southwest of the old Republican City, Nebraska town site where Cloyd attended the Prairie Dog Rural School District No. 7 through the eighth grade. He started high school at Republican City. He later worked with his father on the farm and for other farmers in the area.

On July 12, 1940, Cloyd Eligh Patterson was united in marriage to Doris Marie Young by the Franklin County Judge Smith at the Franklin County Courthouse in Franklin, Nebraska. To this union five children were born, Sharon Marie, Linda Rae, Patricia Ann, Robert Earl and Luetta Jean.

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The family resided in Republican City and Cloyd became employed on the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad at Long Island, Kansas.

On July 21, 1944 he was in-

ducted into the U.S. Army at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. He served with Company L of the 134th Infantry Regiment, 35th Division in the Rhineland and Central

> Europe, which included England, France and Germany during World War II. He received the Good Conduct Medal, the European, African, Middle Eastern Medal and the Victory Medal. He was honorably discharged on July 2, 1946 at Fort Leavenworth,

Kansas.

Following his discharge, the Patterson's made their home in Long Island and Cloyd again became employed by the Burlington Northern Railroad. He was employed by the railroad for 37 years.

After retiring, the Pattersons' moved to Republican City in 1995. Cloyd entered the Colonial Villa Good Samaritan Center in Alma September 9 of this year.

Cloyd was a former member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion and the Long Island Lions Club.

As a hobby, Cloyd repaired televisions and lawn mowers. He could fix about anything. He was an electrician, carpenter, and was a jack-of-all-trades. In 1956, he built their first television set from a heath kit.

He was preceded in death by his father on August 31, 1966; his mother on September 28, 1997; two sisters, Alta Irene Kinnaman

Check pressure canners before storing

Although it is not quite time to think of putting canning equipment away for the season, it will soon be time to do that. Before packing up and forgetting about those items that served you so well this past preserving season, take time to give them a little tender loving care! You will be glad you did next year when you see those first signs of vegetables in the garden and fruits beginning to ripen.

First, start with your biggest investment, the pressure canner. For safe operation next season, clean the vent and safety valve. To clean the vent, draw a clean string or narrow strip of cloth through the opening. Check to make sure the safety valve is free of debris and operates freely. Clean the valve by removing, if possible or following the manufacturer's instructions.

Next, check the gasket which is the rubber or rubber-like compound that helps seal the edges of the canner and lid to prevent steam from escaping. Gaskets are removable for cleaning or re-

placement by following the manufacturer's directions. If needed, new gaskets can be ordered from the canner manufacturer or found at hardware stores. (Some canners do not have gaskets and use a metal to metal seal instead.)

If your canner has a dial gauge, go ahead and mark your calendar now for a time to have your gauge tested in early spring. Contact your local K-State Research and Extension Office for information on checking the accuracy of the gauge. This should be done well in advance of canning season so that if the gauge tests off more than 1 pound of pressure at 5, 10, or 15 pounds, it can be replaced. If your canner has a dial gauge, be careful not to immerse the gauge when cleaning.

The darkened surface on the inside of an aluminum canner can be cleaned by filling it above the darkened line with a mixture of 1 tablespoon cream of tartar to each quart of water. Place the canner on the stove, heat water to a boil, and boil covered until the dark deposits disappear.

Sometimes stubborn deposits may require the addition of more cream of tartar. Empty the canner and wash it with hot soapy water, rinse and dry. (Hint: deposits from hard water may be reduced if you add 1 tablespoon of white vinegar to the water in the canner while you process your jars.)

Store the canner with crumpled clean paper towels in the bottom and around the rack. This will help absorb moisture and odors. Place the lid upside down on the canner. Never put the lid on the canner and seal it.
