Tower work comes to an end

Work on the water tower was nearing completion at the end of the week with the Blue jay mascot on the north and south sides of the tower. Rob Lawson, city administrator, told city council the work would be done by Thursday, but the tower could not be refilled until seven days after the painting is complete.

He said that was to give the paint t to dry so air pockets do not develop.

Mr. Lawson told the council that pumps would still be in use at the water treatment plant for another week, and that the pressure release valves would continue to run.

The tower was painted on the inside and outside with blue lettering and a blue roof in honor of the Norton Bluejays.

Mr. Lawson said the mascot can be seen from the high school parking lot.

"We encourage people to come in and talk to us," Mr. Kuhn said.



New flu warnings issued for employers

The fear of a pandemic H1N1 virus is causing the Kansas Department of Health and Environment to issue warnings to employers regarding their policies for sick-leave for their employees.

Gina Frack, Norton County health department nurse, said influenza may have an impact on employer's policies.

Dr. Jason Eberhart-Phillips, state health officer and director of health for the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, released a letter to Kansas businesses providing guidance and asking for their assistance in limiting the spread of the 2009 H1N1 virus this fall

and winter.

"Businesses across Kansas will play an important role in helping us limit the spread of the virus," Dr. Eberhart-Phillips

"We can't say for sure what will happen in Kansas, but as we move into the fall and winter flu season it is time for businesses and employees to prepare. We are fortunate that so far the disease has been relatively mild, but the number of cases of disease in the southern hemisphere has far exceeded normal seasonal flu levels," he said.

"It's a good time to review policies now, in case of a wide spread illness,"

\$1 million investigation has concluded in Colby

In an investigation that has made headlines around Kansas, local, state and federal law enforcement agencies have recovered more than \$1 million in stolen farm equipment from a property

about four miles north of Colby. The son of a former sheriff was jailed as officers seized the implements and hauled them to town. The equipment was locked up at the city shop. Lawmen in as many as four states were trying to track down all the thefts.

Robert Blecha, director of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, said in a statement Tuesday that the Thomas County Sheriff's Office began the investigation

after a check on a John Deere 7820 tractor during a traffic stop Thursday afternoon found it had been reported stolen from Colorado.

Search warrants were issued and a search of a property north of Colby turned up more than \$1.3 million in allegedly stolen farm equipment, including a combine, grain cart and several tractors. Blecha said the equipment was reported stolen from Kansas, Colorado, Nebraska and Oklahoma.

Matthew Jones, a farmer in rural Thomas County, was arrested and booked into the county jail Thursday afternoon in connection with the stolen property. Jones was later re-arrested on warrants
