Health department selected for accreditation program

The Norton County Health Department was selected by the Public Health Accreditation Board to participate in a test of the new national voluntary public health accreditation program.

selected from more than 145 applicants, the health department will work through the accreditation process and will provide valuable feedback that will inform the voluntary accreditation program's national launch in 2011.

As one of 30 public health agencies

While there are standards for hospitals, schools, law enforcement agencies and even daycare centers, there has not previously been a nationally-recognized set of standards for public health departments despite the critical role they play in preserving and promoting the health of communities and residents. The goal of public health accreditation is to improve and protect the health of the public by advancing the quality and performance of all health departments in the country.

"The launch of the test is a critical step that moves us closer to a national voluntary accreditation program that is practical and promotes continuous quality improvement in all health departments,' said Public Health Accreditation Board president and chief executive officer Kaye Bender, RN, PhD, FAAN.

"The overwhelming number of applications we received from health departments that wanted to be test sites signals

Harvest on hold due to the weather

Wet weather is causing delays in the winter wheat planting, but it is also causing delays for the corn, dryland bean and hay harvests.

Twin Creeks Extension Agent Keith VanSkike said soybeans need to be harvested soon.

"The moisture, wind and changing temperatures cause damage to the bean pod," he said.

"It is critical to get soybeans harvested," he said.

VanSkike said he has heard good reports on the soybean crops. He attributed it to good moisture in August.

Other crops under harvest include corn, sorghum and hay.

VanSkike said the corn and sorghum will stand for awhile.

"The corn looks really good," he said. VanSkike said the hay harvest is also underway and cautioned farmers about harvesting damp hay.

Packing damp hay results in loss of protein as well as rotting.

There are two kinds of hay: cane and alfalfa. He said cane hay is harvested once a year, but alfalfa is harvested several times each year.

He expects farmers to be able to cut five times this year, due to the increased moisture.

Wheat planting has been underway, but the damp weather has slowed it somewhat.

"Sept. 25 – Oct. 10 is the prime time for planting. We're stretching that. Right now, they've got to get their wheat planted," he said.
