In the second game we played ThunderRidge and once again let the Longhorns know we meant business and won convincingly 25-11, 25-15.

Next in our pool schedule was Pike Trail's Lakeside. We had opened the season with the Knights and had to go to three sets before winning.

The Knights had improved since the opening date, but so have we and using our power game won in two sets, 25-23, 25-17.

Our next foe was Pike Trail's Southern Cloud. A team with good solid players who did not let soft hits reach the floor.

That was our down fall. We, accept for Alison Cole, could not get our soft roll shots to fall into a hole.

When the rest of the team did try to attack their block it was blocked. The Warriors won in two 22-25, 22-25.

This sent us to Agra where we played number 1 tournament

seed and number 1 in the state of Kansas, St. John's of Beloit. They have a very fine team that uses a double block system all across the net.

The reason they are whatever and one on the year is that teams are trying to go through their block instead of using common sense and going over it where there are only three players to cover the entire court as their setter is the "garbage collector" right behind the block.

We only have one hitter that could go over a double block, Alison Cole.

The rest of our 5'6 and shorter hitters (Chris Anderson is 5'7, but is our setter who does not attack) have been taught to "roll" shots over blocks and to the opponents back row.

This skill fits nicely into a scheme to defeat a good blocking team.

We gave St. John's a run for their gold medals. We lost the first set 21-25 but came back and won the second 25-18 by making their back row chase after our roll shots that found the floor and gave us the set win.

In the third set we just broke down defensively as they pounded away and we just did not answer. Final score 15-25.

In our last game of the day which was our fourth in a row and fifth of the last six played in the tournament (doesn't seem quite fair does it? when no other team played more than two in a row

in pool play with three hours to rest after that to get ready for the championship bracket.)

Our final game was against Pike Trail's Rock Hills. We played hard and just good enough to be in the game but losing 23-25 in the first set.

The second set is where the unbelievable occurred. We went out quickly 6-1, 15-6, 20-12 and had the set in hand. Then the "wheels fell of the wagon."

We got to 24 with the Grizzlies having 16 we could not do anything right from there on. Serve receive, which is a strong point couldn't get the ball to our setter.

Our hitters fell into a pattern of soft hitting and even just tipping the ball over which gave them the chance to thump it and they did, which our defense, which is also one of our strengths, could not stop. Result 25-27 loss and a fourth place finish.

Overall, a good day of competitive volleyball. We will never have to play four in a row for the rest of the season, but we will take these lessons and learn from them as we move on into regional play.

Huskies put up a good fight in district play in Alma

The Northern Valley Huskies put up a good battle against Golden Plains in District play in Alma on Friday night before losing 42-14.

Golden Plains led by just 12-6 after the first quarter, 20-14 at halftime and 26-14 after three quarters.

"This was by far the best game we have played this year," said Northern Valley head coach Chuck Fessenden.

"The first half was well played on both sides of the ball.

"We began to fade in the fourth quarter as injuries began to pile up.

"This game will definitely give us something to build on for next

week." Northern Valley rushed for 245 yards on 53 carries for an outstanding 4.6 yard per carry average but Golden Plains ran up even more yardage on the ground.

They gained 413 yards on the same number of carries for a 7.8 yard average.

Scoring was as follows: Northern Valley's Dusty Eagleburger, 60 yard run, PAT pass failed, 6-0, 11:22; Golden Plains' Issac Broeckelman, 52 yard run, PAT run failed, 6-6, 5:17; etc. etc.

Eagleburger led Northern Valley in rushing by carrying the ball 14 times and gaining 147 yards for an average of 10.5 yards per carry.

Jacob Gallentine gained 80 yards on 20 carries for the Huskies. Calen Bach gained 19 yards on 7 carries.

Austin Herman completed 4 of 8 passes for 30 yards. Jacob Gallentine caught 3 passes for 27 yards.

Leading tackler for the Huskies was Hutch Gerke with 9 solos, 8 assists, 17 total, followed by Colton Lowry, 11, 3, 14; Gallentine 5, 6, 11; followed by Calen Bach 7, 3, 10 and Steve Brown 6, 2, 8.

Next action Northern Valley's next action will be Friday when they host Wheatland-Grinnell at 7 p.m. in Alma.

Southeast of Saline won the girls championship with 88 points, followed by Minneapolis, 89; Sacred Heart, 99; Lincoln, 104; Norton, 115; Belleville, 124; Osborne, 140; Ellsworth, 179; Lakeside, 238; Southern Cloud, 254; Pike Valley, 268; Tescott, 303.

Minneapolis won the boys championship with 67 points, followed by Beloit, 97; Belleville, 101; Norton, 103; Southeast of Saline, 111; Sacred Heart, 118; Ellsworth, 134; Phillipsburg, 189; Lincoln, 203; Tescott, 269; Pike Valley, 281; Smith Center, 300; Osborne, 334.

Girls "We knew this would be the most competitive race of the season so far," said Norton head cross country coach George Rossi.

"We were not in the best form. Julia Kent did not run due to illness and Kaylen Rossi and Abby Bainter were also sick. Not using that as an excuse, we still were in the top five. Every team that beat us is ranked in the state in their class. This was great practice for regionals and that race will be no easier."

"Our focus now is singular. We know we have to be in the top three teams in the regional

in order to compete as a team at state. Our girls know what they need to do and they will compete to the best of their ability."
