Dewey was a lifetime member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. While serving his country, he married Edna Lou Koester on June 17, 1953 in Densmore.

To this union with Edna, 3 children were born: Dale, Sharon and Roger. Every summer he took his family to Colorado to visit his brother Bernie. Dewey helped on his family farm until moving his family to Phillipsburg, where he worked with Glen Darrah. Dewey built numerous homes, including his own.
