nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team got their 2009-10 season officially underway Wednesday, Oct. 21 with a meeting of prospective girls and boys shooters and their parents at the BB Gun Museum on east U.S. 36 Highway in Norton.

A large crowd was in attendance to learn more about the gun safety classes and BB gun marksmanship program that has attracted national attention through the years since the Norton Jaycees program was accepted by the National Jaycees and Daisy Manufacturing in the 60s.

All youths ages 8-14 years of age as of Dec. 31, 2009 were invited to attend and 15 were present with their parents.

"I was pleased with the turnout," said Norton head BB gun coach Cameron Archer.

"We had six new shooters and I was glad to see them. We also have some excellent returning shooters so it looks as if we can have another good team."

The annual shooting education program begins every year in October and will have four weeks of classroom instruction, followed by marksmanship and culminating in shooting competition.

The Kansas State BB Gun Championships were hosted by the Kansas State Rifle Association on March 14 in Alma. They were formerly hosted by the Kansas State Jaycees.

Norton was third in shooting but placed fourth overall which included the written test on safe hunting. Norton has won the state shoot more times than any other community.

The international shoot is held the first of July and has been in Bowling Green, Ky. in recent years.

The top three marksmanship teams in each state shoot qualify to compete in the international shoot.

Teams may also qualify for the international shoot by placing in the top three in the State 4-H Shooting Match. Norton competed in this shoot after the regular state shoot.

The state 4-H shoot was held on April 18 and was also held in Alma. Norton placed third, which qualified them for the international shoot.

Norton has won the international shoot eight times, more than any other team in the nation. Norton placed seventh in the international shoot in 2008 but decided not to compete this year.

The Norton team was originally sponsored by the Norton Jaycees and the Norton Rotary assumed sponsorship when there was no longer a Jaycees chapter in Norton.

The original shooting education program approved by the U.S. Jaycees and Daisy Manufacturing was submitted by Norton Jaycee member Duane Winder. A plaque in his honor is in the BB Gun Museum, which also contains trophies, medals, newspaper articles and other memorabilia of the Norton shooting education program.

On Wednesday evening, Norton head coach Cameron Archer began the meeting by welcoming everyone and introducing assistant coach Mike Campbell and new classroom instructor Chanda (Braun) McKenna, who was a champion Norton BB gun marksman and continued on to become successful in college competition.

Coach Archer stressed that the shooters would have a practice every Wednesday evening until after the state shoot.

"You will learn proper gun safety and that even a BB gun can be dangerous," he said.

"You must know shooting safety rules before you get a gun to shoot. We are serious about this program and expect shooters to be as well."

He said being part of the program is not that expensive and that guns are provided if a youth doesn't own one.

He said cost of targets, BBs and books is minimal.

"We also ask that we have some volunteer parents to help with grading targets and assist with coaching," he said.

"I'm looking forward to the new season. It's a long season but it's worth it!"

During the evening, youngsters had the opportunity to shoot BB guns on the range with instruction from coaches Archer and Campbell.

The girls and boys and their parents also enjoyed touring the museum to learn more about Norton's rich BB gun history.





