

The Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum is proud to present "Nashville Portraits: Photographs by Jim McGuire", organized by the Morris Museum of Art, Augusta, Ga., that opened Oct. 9 and will run through December 6.

This exhibition of sixty black and white photographs was selected from thousands of portraits shot over a period of more than thirty years by one of country music's most celebrated photographers, Jim McGuire. The exhibition reflects a continuing project that commenced in 1974 with a portrait of musician John Hartford, and it documents many of the leading figures in the world of country music, from such icons as Bill Monroe, Minnie Pearl and Lester Flatt to contemporary stars like Emmylou Harris, Nanci Grifand women. Packages start at ers of country music Americana, \$139. All five screenings take cultural history and beautiful photography.

As McGuire himself has pointed out, "Over the last 30-plus years, I have had the great good fortune to have met, photographed, and befriended many of my musical heroes. Most of us have a drawer full of snap shots that remind us of the good times. These are mine."

Photographer Jim McGuire might seem an unlikely fan of

hillbilly music, since he grew up in New Jersey in the 1950's. But ever since his first encounter with Hank Snow's "Spanish Fireball" at the age of twelve, that music has been his muse. He became a professional photographer at the behest of an Air Force captain who volunteered him for an aerial reconnaissance mission in 1964, which entailed photographing Vietnamese villages while hanging out of a single-engine plane. Later, he learned basic darkroom skills from a local Vietnamese photographer and honed his skills photographing the troop buildup in Vietnam before receiving an honorable discharge in 1965.

Realizing that photography might serve as a suitable career, McGuire moved to New York and began assisting fashion photographer John Foote who introduced him to the work of Irving Penn. fith and Marty Stuart. This is an Penn's photographs of tradesexhibition that will appeal to lov- men with their tools inspired McGuire's acclaimed "Nashville Portraits" series (the subject of a separate SITES exhibition proposal), which features some of America's most influential singers, songwriters, and musicians,

often with the instruments that are the tools of their trade.
