Board Briefly possible **budget cuts**

ebradley@nwkansas.com Norton Community Schools are anticipating having their budget cut this year as the state struggles with their increasing deficit.

Superintendent Greg Mann gave information regarding possible revenue cuts to the Norton School Board during last Monday's meeting. In an interview with The Telegram after the meeting, he said there could be two sets of cuts during this school year. He expects the first round of cuts to come before the end of the month, totaling \$150 per full time enrollment. Mann said the reduction to this year's published budget would be \$54,000.

He said the cuts are due to higher enrollments across the state, more students qualifying for free meals and lowered valuations. He said tax revenues are also expected to be short by an estimated \$400 million, meaning deeper cuts will have to be made to state-funded programs.

"If education is cut in relation to the percentage of the state budget it comprises, that will be an additional \$200 per full time enrollment," Mann said.

The cuts would add up to \$350 per full time enrollment and would cost an estimated \$306,000.

During the school board meeting, the board voted to join School for Fair Funding. The nonprofit coalition advocates for fair funding for schools. They began a lawsuit in 1999 with the state legislature approving a three year, \$466 million in-

"The Law in Kansas still states that the "USD 211 has joined with school districts across the state as a way to ensure that in the future the legislature follows its own laws and the directive of the State's Supreme Court," he said.
