
Annual worship night scheduled

Norton water is still 'safe'

Kansas Department of Health and Environment recently cited the City of Norton for by-products of Triamylamine in the drinking water. The issue was discussed at Wednesday's city council meeting with Rob Lawson, city administrator, saying precautionary letters will go out to the public Dec. 4.

In an interview after the meeting, Lawson told The Telegram the issue with Triamylamines will be resolved when the work at the plant is complete. He said the quality of the water has not changed.

"The water is safe to drink," he said.

When the final phase is complete, water will be treated for Triamylamine at the water plant.

There were two other violations: the water clarifier is down and the wells are not all up and running.

Lawson said the violations are nothing major.

He said the clarifier filters mud and other sludge from the water.

"It's like a cleaning system," he said.

Lawson said repairs have been done, but the clarifier is not up and running yet.

Three out of five wells have been drilled and drilling for the other two is underway. Lawson said the field is 60 percent complete.

"The well drilling is going well," he said.

The council discussed the work on the well field. One well is not producing as much volume as it should. Lawson said it would save an estimated \$20,000 if

Funding for education is expected to be cut again at the

end of November, leaving school districts across Kansas hurting. Northern Valley Schools Superintendent George Griffith presented financial information to the board of education during their Nov. 9 meeting.

In an interview after the meeting, Griffith told The Telegram his district will have an estimated \$65,000–150,000 cut for this school year.

He said the cuts are not only due to the recession, it is also due to the failure of the Legislature to plan ahead.

Griffith said they knew there would be a \$426 million deficit in 2009 several years ago but cut taxes last year and this year.

Funding cuts are affecting the education provided to children.

"We're looking at throwing away an entire generation by making these cuts," he said.

Griffith said schools are expected to do more with less. They still have to make adequate yearly progress and meet other standards set by the state.

"What we're expected to do continues to increase. Despite the cuts, our teachers and staff are doing an excellent job. It's a blessing for our students," he said. Grffith said the district has some money in reserves but not enough to cover the cuts.

"We've been hit by the recession too," he said. School districts across Kansas are deciding whether to join Schools for Fair Funding, a nonprofit coalition threatening to sue the state over funding concerns. Griffith said the board was scheduled to vote during a special meeting yesterday.

"It shouldn't be necessary for schools to force the Legislature to fund them," he said.

In other school board business:

• Griffith reported the damage to the football field has been repaired, and the damaged area has been seeded and fertilized.

One of the Northern Valley buses was damaged when it hit a deer. Repairs are being made.

Griffith also said he, Ms. Wilson, Annette Puent and Cindy Lowry took the fourth grade class to Norton's They Also Ran Gallery. The class was also treated to ice cream at Dairy Queen for good behavior. He will treat the third grade class soon for their behavior points.

Deadline for vehicle tag renewals approaching

Nov. 30 is the last day to renew vehicle tags if your last name begins with "T," "V" or "W" or your business name begins with "T," "V" or "W." New items needed are Driver License or Identification number for each owner or Federal Employer Identification number for the business in addition to the insurance. Vehicle business is done from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily. The Treasurer's office will be closed on Nov. 26 and Nov. 27 for Thanksgiving.

Driver license renewals can be done Tuesday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Remember to bring along your social security card or something that has your social security number on it for verification.

Instructional permits (IP) and Driver Education restricted licenses can be processed in the office by appointment. You will need to bring a state issued original certified birth certificate, social security card and a utility bill with current address plus the driver license of the parent that brings the child.
