Area schools face delayed payments

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School funding took another hit this month when the state announced December payments to schools would be delayed by several weeks. The delay has caused problems for many schools who need the money to meet payroll and other bills.

Norton Schools Superintendent Greg Mann said the state has delayed payments for the last two months. They received a payment at the beginning of November

and December, but those payments did not cover the expected amount. The state makes monthly payments to schools.

Mann said he hopes the other half of December's payment will come in January.

"It affects our cash flow. In Kansas, you can't spend what you don't have," he said.

He said contingency money will be used to offset the delayed state payment.

"We do not have enough money in reserve to fund us

for very long," he said.

"We have also been shorted the full amount for special education," he said.

The state was supposed to make \$75 million in special education payments in December. Mann is unsure when those funds will be sent.

Lenora Elementary School is facing a similar issue. When Gov. Parkinson cut school funding last month Lenora lost an estimated \$40,000. Superintendent Gary

Cleanup continues after snow storm

Much of Norton closed down Tuesday when another snow storm moved into the area dumping almost a foot of snow. The National Weather Service in Goodland reported 11 inches of snow on Tuesday. On Sunday, 6.7 inches were reported. Winds were reported to be between 25–35 miles-per-hour. Carolyn Kingham reported five inches falling Sunday and eight yesterday. Monday and were closed Tuesday and Wednesday. Many businesses closed early Tuesday.

The storm kept crews busy plowing and clearing roads.

Public Works Supervisor Dan Bainter said cleanup work will continue until early next week.

Wind caused blowing snow to slow the public works crews.

Underinsured or uninsured Norton County residents now have the option of participating in a discount card program intended to save 20–25 percent on prescriptions.

Norton County is making free prescriptions drug discount cards available under a program sponsored

by the National Association of Counties, which offers average savings of 22 percent off the retail price of commonly prescribed drugs. Savings is based on what kind of prescription is being filled.

Cards will be available at the Norton County Clerk's office, Norton County Courthouse, 2nd floor, or at Norton County Health Department, 801 N. Norton.

They are accepted at Moffet Drug and Pamida Phar-

macy in Norton.

"We'll gladly accept them," said Moffet Drug technician Patty Newell.

Norton County Clerk Robert Wyatt said there is no enrollment form, no membership fee and no restrictions or limits on frequency of use. Cardholders can use the card any time their prescriptions are not covered by

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
