Burning off holiday calories

Food and food safety pros have numerous tips for preparing a traditional holiday dinner, but, there are few recommendations for working off the calories from those dinners.

A modest holiday dinner, with three ounces of skinless roast turkey; four ounces (one half cup) of mashed potatoes; two tablespoons of gravy; four ounces of green bean casserole; four ounces of honey-glazed carrots; dinner roll with two teaspoons of soft

margarine; relishes (including a stalk of celery, one ounce sweet pickle, one cinnamon-spiced apple ring, one tablespoon black

olives, three tablespoons jellied cranberry sauce) and a slice of pumpkin pie with a tablespoon of whipped topping will have about 1,100 calories, 38 grams of fat, 150 grams carbohydrate and 40 grams of protein.

With food, fellowship and gratitude the goal for the holiday, consider moderate physical activity to help burn the extra calories, rather than tipping the scale upwards. Try waiting 30 or more minutes after eating to allow

time for digestion before moderate physical activity.

A person weighing 154 pounds should plan on about four hours of walking at 3-1/2 miles per hour or two hours of jogging at five miles per hour to burn all of the calories consumed during the sample holiday meal.

New exhibit at Hansen Museum

Dane G. Hansen Museum is proud to present "Sum of the Parts, Surface Design Association Membership Exhibition 2007, Juried by Kyoung Ae Cho and Jan Myers-Newbury" scheduled to run through Feb. 7, 2010.

Individual strands interlock and interlace to create structure. Multiple units connect becoming composition and texture.

Color, pattern and imagery combine into complex surfaces. In the exhibition the Surface Design Association brings together the work of its members as individuals to create a whole that is more than simply the Sum of the Parts.

As part of the Surface Design Association's 2007 International Conference held at the Kansas City Art Institute, members were invited to submit work measuring 52" h by 18" w for an installation showcasing innovative use of textiles. The 100 pieces juried into this exhibition show a wide range of materials, techniques, thought processes, context and concept of

its members.

Fibers and materials range from window screening to gold leaf, bamboo to bailing twine, chicken wire to silk organza.

The works are hand dyed, woven knitted, crocheted, quilted, batiked, rusted, composted, digitally printed, hand stitched, painted, discharged, fused, appliques, hooked, Jacquard woven, collaged, stamped, braided, screen printed, bonded, felted, embroidered, waxed and pieced.

The mission of the Surface Design Association is to increase awareness, understanding and appreciation of textiles in the art and design communities, as well as in the general public.

The Association inspires creativity and encourages innovation, furthering the rich tradition of the textile arts through publications, exhibitions, conferences and educational opportunities.

A force in the textile field since 1977, the nonprofit Surface Design Association is committed to

education on all levels of expertise and interest.

It's membership of more than 4000 includes a broad spectrum of textile practitioners: studio artists, industrial designers, educators, technicians, curators, gallery owners, interior designers, students and enthusiasts.

The showing is part of a national tour over a two year period containing one hundred unique works, each measuring 52" h by 18" w and showcasing the innovative use of textiles.
