

Burning off holiday calories

Food and food safety pros have numerous tips for preparing a traditional holiday dinner, but, there are few recommendations for working off the calories from those dinners. A modest holiday dinner, with

three ounces of skinless roast turkey; four ounces (one half cup) of mashed potatoes; two tablespoons of gravy; four ounces of green bean casserole; four ounces of honey-glazed carrots; dinner roll with two teaspoons of soft



margarine; relishes (including a stalk of celery, one ounce sweet pickle, one cinnamon-spiced apple ring, one tablespoon black

olives, three tablespoons jellied cranberry sauce) and a slice of pumpkin pie with a tablespoon of whipped topping will have about 1,100 calories, 38 grams of fat, 150 grams carbohydrate and 40 grams of protein. With food, fellowship and

gratitude the goal for the holiday, consider moderate physical activity to help burn the extra calories, rather than tipping the scale upwards. Try waiting 30 or more minutes after eating to allow

time for digestion before moderate physical activity. Aperson weighing 154 pounds
