Council discusses contract

Problems with a contractor have arisen as the City of Norton attempts to wrap up work at the water treatment plant. Work in the well field is continuing, although the contractor did not meet the Dec. 31, 2009 deadline.

At Wednesday's city council meeting, the council discussed the missed deadline as well as the contract with Downing Drilling.

"He's already in violation of his contract," said City Administrator Rob

The city may fine the drilling company \$500 per day for the unfinished work.

Lawson said he filed an extension request through the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. The request was approved with a new deadline of Dec. 31, 2010 given.

"It's a bunch of work to go through. We look bad, and it's because of him," Lawson said.

The contractor is asking the city to recognize there were several bad weather

City Attorney Karen Griffiths said she would like to see exactly which weather days he is claiming.

"He was supposed to be done Dec. 31. He's already in trouble, but he's asking that you recognize some dates. He probably has had some problems," Lawson

"He has been doing a good job," he

"Our goal has always been to get this done by the end of the year," he said.



Durham tournament scheduled for Saturday

Competing in addition to the Norton varsity and junior varsity teams will be wrestling squads from Atwood, Beloit, Cozad, Hoxie, Leoti, McCook, Mill Valley, Oakley, Scott City and Smith Center.

Mill Valley did not have school today due to weather conditions and the dual scheduled with them this evening has been canceled. As of the Telegram's press time, Mill Valley had not made a decision regarding competing in Saturday's

The first session on Saturday will begin at 9:30 a.m. on two or three mats. It will be followed by the championship quarterfinals on three mats, championship semifinals on two front mats and consolation round one on the back mat.

Following the lunch break, consolation quarterfinals will be held on three mats and will be followed by the consolation semifinals on three mats.

After a short break to remove the back mat, the NCHS pep band will begin playing at around 4:30 p.m.

The second session will begin at approximately 5 p.m. and will feature fifth and sixth place matches on two mats and third and fourth place matches on two mats.

Following these matches, the dance team will perform.

Next, Norton's state medal winners from 1940, 1960, 1970, 1980, 1990 and 2000 will be introduced to the crowd. Each will receive a certificate of wrestling excellence from J.R. "Jake" Durham in honor of the anniversary of their state medal.

The tournament championship finalists will be introduced followed by the pep band playing the Star Spangled Banner.

The championship finals will then be held on one mat around 5:30 p.m. All times are estimated and may vary
