"They've pretty much worked every day, even during the bad weather," he said.

Lawson said Downing Drilling is 90 percent done and is asking for a payment of \$107,877.51.

He said the council needed to move on the payment because it would take two weeks for the state to complete the payment.

The payment would come out of the city's loan fund.

A motion was made to approve the payment to Downing Drilling. Vote taken, motion passed.

In other council business: • Three council seats are up for election this year including Ward I, Ward II and Ward III.

The seats are currently held by Jeff Otter, Donna Foley and Toby Kuhn. The filing deadline is noon on Jan. 26.

Forms can be picked up at the county courthouse or at the city office. If more than two people run for a seat, a primary election will be held March 2.

• Mayor David Corns reported on sales tax receipts. The city collected \$17,037.47 in November, and the county collected \$12,522.97.

The total so far for 2009 is

\$425,283.99 The mayor said last year the total was \$468,740, and in 2007 the total was \$425,301.

The mayor said sales taxes for 2009 will not be as good as they were in 2008.

Lawson said Norton County Commissioner John Miller visited with him about county sales tax receipts.

The county has seen a 20 percent decrease in recent months, and Miller wanted the council to be aware of the trend.

• Jeff Otter reported on the last safety meeting. \$22,000 was budgeted in 2010 for a new police car.

Discussion was held on whether to purchase a 2010 Dodge Charger, at a cost of \$20,000, or to look into buying a used Ford Explorer from a local dealer.

A motion was made to have the police chief check into prices at local dealers before a decision is made. Vote taken, motion passed.

A motion was made to have the police chief get three price quotes for hand-held radios. Vote taken, motion passed.

• A motion was made to pass resolution 1-2010, to waive the annual requirement of generally accepted accounting principles and fixed asset accounting. Vote taken, motion passed.

• A motion was made to pass resolution 2-2010, to adopt salaries for certain city employees including the municipal court judge, court clerk, animal control, city prosecutor, city attorney, city treasurer, fire chief, assistant fire chief, lieutenant, safety officer and captain.
