

windbreaks on their farm near Lenora. According to the conservation office, farmers plants windbreaks on the north and west sides of their home to protect against wind and other elements, which reduces utility bills. Many farmers also plant windbreaks to protect their

land from soil erosion. The Brandyberrys have planted thousands of trees on their property. He said 1,000 trees were planted last year.

Most of the trees are Austrian, although some are Ponderosa trees.

"We started planting trees in 1992," Brandyberry said.

He said his wife takes care of the trees and planted most of them.

"She's the one who takes care of them," he said.

Brandyberry said some years there has been little moisture. One year there was an 1.25 inches of moisture, including snow, sleet, rain and hail.

"We're lucky we saved any of them," he said.

His advice to people who want to start planting trees is to not do it during a drought.
