Rutherford chose Norton County because he already owned land here that was being farmed by his father-in-law. He also liked the people and kids of Norton County, so he left the big city for farm life.

He made a studio in a portion of his barn, and then added on to that twice to make more room and offer more background choices

for portraits. He then decided he needed even more room and told his wife, Jackie, that he would build a 40 by 60 garage and part of it would be dedicated for his photography studio.

Since the passing of his wife, Jackie, last year, Rutherford has become more involved in the United Parish Church in Lenora, serving as treasurer. He has even designed new note cards commemorating the United Parish Church Rutherford says keeping people in Norton County and keeping money in the county is one of the challenges for the business future.
