### Grant funds courses for Norton inmates

tional Facility on Tuesday, family, friends and teachers gathered to see nine inmates graduate from a business program run by Colby Community College.

The prison partnered with the college and Kansas Workforce to allow 20 inmates to enroll in the program. It was paid for by a \$30,000 KAN-GO grant, which covered tuition and books for the

A second group is currently in the program and is expected to graduate in

Colby Community College Director of Adult Education Nance Munderloh said they are looking at two options for the rest of the grant.

A third group may participate, or they will have twice as many inmates enroll for six credits and have them continue during the next fiscal year.

If they pursue the second option, the inmates would be responsible for part of their tuition.

Education has not been an option for many people who are incarcerated, and the chance to attend school, either through a GED program or by taking college courses, gives the inmates a chance at a future.

"The grant offers an opportunity for those with the least ability to succeed. The prison is in our service area and seemed to be a prime place for this grant," Munderloh said.

Of the nine who graduated, several expressed an interest in continuing their education.

Munderloh has researched prison statistics, which show 97 percent of all inmates are released from prison. Many end up returning.

"We can either educate them prior to release so they won't return, or we can

## Award \$101 million \* to Rural Telephone

On Tuesday, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that Rural Telephone and its wholly-owned subsidiary. Nex-Tech, was one of 14 recipients selected for Recovery Act Broadband Infrastructure funding as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. The Lenora-based telecommunications cooperative and its Hays-based subsidiary will receive a grant of \$49,588,807 and loan funds of \$51,612,842 that will enable the development of broadband services in unserved and underserved areas of central and western Kansas. In all, the United States Department of Agriculture announced broadband projects totaling \$309,923,352 in 11 states.

President Obama signed The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 into law on Feb. 17, 2009. Altogether, Congress awarded the United States Department of Agriculture \$2.5 billion in Recovery Act funding to help bring broadband services to rural unserved and underserved communities.

"Kansas jobs have been hit hard by the economic downturn in manufacturing, construction, professional and business services and a lack of broadband availability," stated Rural Telephone CEO/ General Manager Larry E. Sevier.

"These funds will immediately put people to work in central and western Kansas, building a state-of-the-art network that will bring broadband to residents and businesses with no access or limited access to these vital communication services." he added.

"Rural Telephone / Nex-Tech will look

at hiring up to 17 employees with this project, but the engineering firms and contractors that are coming in to western Kansas will also be looking to 'staff up' as well. We estimate that we'll create approximately 400 jobs with this broadband loan and grant.'

According to Sevier, the massive construction project will impact 21 towns and 26 rural areas spanning over 4,600 square miles in Decatur, Ellis, Gove, Graham, Norton, Osborne, Phillips, Rooks, Sheridan, Smith and Trego Counties in

"When completed, this expanded network will provide high speed services to nearly 23,000 households and businesses within the Rural Telephone and Nex-Tech footprint, including 335 community anchor institutions such as schools, libraries, hospitals, clinics, county health agencies, law enforcement agencies, senior and disability centers,"

Sevier said. To most effectively utilize the broadband stimulus funds, and to provide the maximum benefit to the greatest number of households and businesses, Sevier indicated the project would utilize two complementing technologies.

"We plan to build a Fiber-To-The-Premise (FTTP) network in combination with WiMAX technology to provide sustainable, viable, high-speed telecommunications services at affordable rates," Sevier said.
