Ed Ballinger is sharing his collection of Lego projects. Ed said, "When I was a kid, I never had any Legos. Now I have discovered how much fun they are. I have made sure that my three grandkids will not be Lego-less."

Ed loans them out, one project at a time, to his grandson Michael. As he grows, Michael will be able to build the more difficult structures. The other grandchildren, Dahn and Seana, will follow in Michael's footsteps.

LEGO is a line of construction toys manufactured by a company in Denmark. Legos are colorful interlocking plastic bricks and an accompanying array of gears, mini figures and other parts. With these you can construct objects, buildings, vehicles and even robots, which can be taken apart and used again and again. Legos were originally designed in the 1930's in Europe, but today have international appeal. Annual production of Legos averages approximately 20 billion bricks.

Legos are colorful, interesting and fun. Ed has 62 Lego bricks as well as those for the grandkids. He asks, "Do you have yours?"

In one of the lobby cases, Elaine Johnson has displayed a variety of pins she has collected over the years. Elaine remembers the very first pins she received were two identical wiener dog pins, which were to be worn on bobby socks (remember those days?). The next pin she remembers receiving was a mustard seed pin. Do you have one? Elaine bought a box at an antique auction that, she knew, had one beautiful cameo pin and was surprised to find several.

Some pins were her mother's; others were from family and friends for different occasions. There are political pins, school pins, jeweled pins, fabric pins, stick pins and even some made from safety pins.

Elaine has not made an exact count of her collection, but estimates that she has more than 100.

Carol Griffith, County Project Chair Photography, coordinated plans and put up the display.


