Lady Jays get off to a good start, lose 42-31

varsity basketball team got off to a good start against No.10 state ranked Smith Center in Mid-Continent League play on Tuesday in the NCHS Stull Gymnasium in Norton but couldn't hold on and lost 42-31.

The Lady Jays held a 15-10 lead after one quarter with three baskets by senior post Kaitlyn Wolf, two field goals by senior point guard Ashlie Stewart, a basket each by senior guard Kendra Engelbert and sophomore post Erin Terrell and free throw by junior forward Dustyna Sprigg.

The second quarter didn't go so well for Norton, however, and Smith Center tied the score at 15all with 2:05 left in the half.

The Lady Jays scored on only one free throw by Stewart the rest $of the \, half \, and \, the \, Lady \, Red \, took \, a$ 19-16 advantage into the dressing room at intermission.

Smith Center got some early baskets off their full court press to start the third quarter and jumped out to a 23-16 lead at the 6:35 mark.

Stewart broke the press and drove for two points but three more Lady Red baskets extended their lead to 29-18 with 4:34 left. Norton cut the lead down to 32-25 at the end of the period on three free throws by Stewart, a field goal by Terrell and two charities

Terrell narrowed the Smith Center lead to five points on two free throws to start the final stanza but the Lady Red added four more points on two quick steals off

Stewart scored two points to make it 36-29 with 4:15 left. After two Smith Center free throws, Sprigg added a basket for Norton. Another Lady Red basket and two charities extended their final margin of victory to 11 points.

"We had silly turnovers; a lot of them were unforced," said coach Jilka. "We just didn't take care of the ball.

"We didn't shoot well either but our biggest problem was

"They also outrebounded us and that disappointed me.

'We had their lead down to five points in the fourth quarter then had two silly turnovers. We still had a chance to cut the lead but couldn't get a shot to go down.

"Defensively, we played pretty good although we didn't always block out on rebounds.

"It won't get any easier on Friday at Hill City. We'll have to play better to have a chance to beat them."

Lady Jay junior guard Kaylen Rossi was lost for the season when she injured a knee during practice several days prior to the game and coach Jilka said her absence caused some regrouping problems for his squad.

Norton was outrebounded 22-13 by Smith Center and had 20 turnovers against the Lady Red.

The Norton girls are now 7-7 for the season and the No.10 state ranked Smith Center girls are 11-2.

Leading scorer for Norton was Ashlie Stewart with 12 points on 4 of 13 two-point shots for 31 percent and 4 of 14 free throws for 29 percent.

She missed her only shot from beyond the arc.

Sara Timmons led Smith Center with 12 points.

As a team, Norton missed all three trey tries, hit 11 of 31 twopoint attempts for 35 percent and was 11 of 34 overall for 32 percent. Smith Center also missed all three tries from beyond the arc, hit 16 of 40 two-point tries for 40 percent and was 16 of 43 overall for 38 percent accuracy.

From the free throw line, the Lady Jays threw in 9 of 17 for 53 percent and the Lady Red connected on 10 of 15 for 67 percent.

Norton had 6 offensive and 7 defensive rebounds for 13 total. Smith Center pulled down 9 offensive and 13 defensive caroms for 22 total.

Wolf was leading rebounder for Norton with 3, followed by Engelbert, Sprigg, Meaghan Peterson, Amanda Ray, 2 each; Stewart, Terrell, 1 each.

The Lady Jays had 11 steals and the Lady Red had 12 thefts. Sprigg led Norton with 5 steals, followed by Wolf, 3; Terrell, 2; Stewart, 1.

Norton had 5 offensive assists and Smith Center had 9. Wolf led Norton with 2 assists, followed by Engelbert, Sprigg, Ray, 1 each.

The Lady Jays had 20 turnovers compared to only 5 by the Lady Red.

Junior varsity The Norton girls junior varsity

lost to Smith Center 56-11. The Lady Red held quarter

leads of 18-4, 35-11 and 45-11.

Leading scorers for Norton were Caren Thomson and Teslee Nickell, each with 4 points. Meaghan Peterson scored 3 points.

The Redmen's Dillon Corbett tied the score at 39-all with two free throws with 34 seconds left

Norton brought the ball downcourt and did a good job of working the ball around for one final shot. The ball was in Lane's hands

with seven seconds remaining and he waited until the final moment to put up the shot, which hit nothing but net for a 41-39 Blue Jay victory!

It was a hard fought game in which the two quintets traded leads throughout until the winner was decided on Lane's final

The first quarter ended in a 9-all tie. Lane hit two baskets in the period, one of them a jumper at the buzzer. Senior guard J.D. Gall swished a three-point shot to start the game. Senior guard Marcus Herman hit a driving layup for the Blue Jays' other two points.

Norton found a lid on the basket in the second quarter, hitting only on another driving layup by Herman and a two-point shot by sophomore forward Jordan Wahlmeier.

Meanwhile, Smith Center scored 10 more points as Corbett repeated his performance from the first quarter with three baskets and a free throw. The 10-4 quarter put the Redmen ahead 19-13 at halftime.

The third quarter belonged to Norton, however, as they outscored Smith Center 10-4 to tie the score at 23-all with 4:25 left in the period. Scoring 20 points in

the quarter, Norton took a 33-26 lead. Gall left the nets smoking with another basket from beyond the arc, two two-point field goals and a free throw. Lane added a trey and two-point basket, Wahlmeier found the range on two more field goals and senior forward Ashton Draper hit a two-pointer. Smith Center had just two field goals in the period.

The determined Redmen closed ne gan in the fourth stanza Norton led 38-34 when Alex Hobelmann hit a three-point basket for Smith Center with 1:07 showing on the scoreboard clock to make it a 38-37 game. Wahlmeier hit one of two free

throw attempts with 53 seconds left. Then, Corbett hit two charities to tie it at 39-all. Norton's 8 fourth quarter points

came on Wahlmeier's basket and two free throws, a basket by sophomore guard Tye Nickell and Lane's final basket. "We had trouble hitting the basket and weren't patient enough

on shot selection in the first half," said Norton head boys basketball coach Doug Reusink. "We weren't rebounding very well, either, in the first half. "We did a much better job in the

third quarter and got a good lead but didn't make good choices on shots in the fourth quarter."

Norton had three players in double figures in the scoring column. Gall led with 12 points on 2 of 4 from long range for 50 percent, 2 of 5 two-point shots for 40 percent and 4 of 9 overall for 44 percent. He hit 2 of 3 free throws for 67 percent.

Lane finished with 11 points on 1 of 7 from beyond the arc for 14 percent, 4 of 11 two-point tries for 36 percent and 5 of 18 overall for

Wahlmeier scored 10 points on 4 of 8 two-point shots for 50 percent and 2 of 8 free throws for 25 percent. Leading scorer for Smith Cen-

ter was Corbett with 22 points.

As a team, Norton hit 3 of 13 shots from long range for 23 percent, 14 of 38 two-point attempts for 37 percent and 17 of 51 overall for 33 percent. Smith Center swished 3 of 8

from beyond the arc for 38 percent, 11 of 35 two-point shots for 31 percent and 14 of 43 overall for the same 33 percent as Norton. From the free throw line, Nor-

ton connected on 4 of 15 for 27 percent and Smith Center swished 8 of 17 for 47 percent. Norton had 10 offensive and

20 defensive rebounds for 30 total. Smith Center grabbed 9 offensive and 25 defensive caroms for 34 total. Terrell Lane was leading re-

bounder for Norton with 10 boards, followed by Jordan Wahlmeier, 7; Ashton Draper, 5; Marcus Herman, 4; Dillon Mc-Conney, 3; Tye Nickell, 1. The Blue Jays had 6 steals

compared to 4 by the Redmen. Lane had 2 thefts, followed by Wahlmeier, Draper, Gall, Herman, 1 each. Norton had 10 offensive assists
