tens of thousands of people every year and costs billions of dollars in care. Understanding increased crying in early infancy and its connection to abuse, could help prevent this tragedy.

The Kansas Children's Service League has partnered with the National Center on Shaken Baby Syndrome and the Norton County Hospital to implement The Period of PURPLE Crying® at the hospital's labor and delivery department.

The Period of PURPLE Crying® is the phrase used to describe the point in a baby's life when they cry more than any other time. The initiative is a new way to help parents understand this time in their baby's life, which is a normal part of every child's development. PURPLE is an acronym for Peak of crying, Unexpected, Resists soothing, Pain-like face, Long-Telegram photo by Harriett Gill $\;\;$ lasting and Evening crying.

The triple-dose program, based on more than 25 years of research, aims to educate parents, caregivers and the public about the normalcy of early infant crying (a leading trigger of Shaken Baby Syndrome), as well as to prevent the occurrence of abuse. Another key element of the program is warning parents to be selective when leaving their child in someone else's care and to share the PURPLE information with

The first dose of the program and James Fawcett (also won a includes a 10-minute DVD and an 11-page booklet, which will be distributed to parents in the hospital after the birth of their baby. The information will also be provided to expecting parents through the hospital's birthing classes. The second dose is designed to re-

provide materials to parents who may not have received the materials while at the hospital. Dose Two materials are distributed to parents through professionals the family may already be connected to such as early childhood home visitors, healthcare practitioners, schools and childcare providers. The third dose is a public education and media strategy. This will provide information to members of the community who have not already received the informa-

Misunderstanding normal, frustration and escalate to anger. It's common to feel irritated with seemingly endless bouts of screaming but learning appropriate actions during crying bouts, including comforting and coping techniques, are key components of the PURPLE program.

'Crying is normal behavior for a baby," said Vicky Roper, KCSL's Director of Education and Awareness and Director of Prevent Child Abuse Kansas. "On average babies cry two to three hours per day - sometimes as much as five hours per day. It's how they communicate."

While it is important to tend to your baby's needs if you feel stressed out by your baby's crying, Roper says it's ok to put the baby down in their crib, swing or other safe place while you compose yourself.

"Leave the room for a few minutes or count to 100," she said. "If you feel like you need help, call a friend, a relative or the Parent Helpline at 1-800-CHILDREN."

It is normal for parents to feel frustrated by the crying. For more www.purplecrying.info.

About shaken baby syn-


Shaken Baby Syndrome is the violent shaking of an infant or young child. A young child's head is disproportionate to their large body and their neck muscles are underdeveloped and weak, therefore shaking causes the head to whip back and forth slamming the brain against the skull. Nationally, at least one in four Shaken Baby Syndrome cases result in a fatality.

Survivors face grim statistics early infant crying can lead to as well, with over half suffering permanent disabilities including brain damage, blindness or paralysis. Symptoms of Shaken Baby Syndrome include irritability, difficulty staying awake, difficulty breathing, vomiting or

seizures. The long term affects of Shaken Baby Syndrome are staggering, to the victim, their family and society at large. It is estimated approximately \$1 million is spent in medical costs for each surviving victims in the first three years following a shaking incident, with \$4-9 million spent in lifetime costs.
