nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Doug Reusink's Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team outscored a visiting Hoxie quintet in three of the four quarters on Tuesday evening and that was enough to post a 65-43 Blue Jay victory.

Norton led 17-9 after one quarter but the Indians played them even at 11-all in the second quarter for a 28-20 halftime score.

Norton tallied 18 points in the third quarter compared to just 11 for the visitors to extend their advantage to 46-31 and extended the final margin of victory even more with a 19-12 fourth quarter in their favor.

Both teams hit over 50 percent of their shots but Norton got off almost twice as many attempts as Hoxie. Also, the Blue Jays dominated the backboards, pulling down more than twice as many caroms as the Indians.

Norton's 17 points in the first quarter came on two two-point baskets and two free throws by junior guard Terrell Lane, a basket from long range and two-point field goal from senior guard J.D.

Gall and single two-point baskets by senior forward Ashton Draper, sophomore forward Jordan Wahlmeier and freshman guard Jacob Brooks.

In the Blue Jays' 11-point second quarter, all but one basket came from beyond the arc as Lane, Gall and sophomore guard Tye Nickell each buried a trey! Wahlmeier added a two-point field goal.

Draper warmed up after intermission and his jump shot was deadly. After hitting just one basket in the first quarter, he connected on four in the third period and three in the fourth period.

Lane hit another three-point basket and a two pointer and Gall buried his third trey of the contest in the third quarter.

As a team, Norton hit 8 of 19 three-point tries for 42 percent, 18 of 29 two-point tries for 62 percent and 16 of 48 overall for an excellent 54 percent.

Hoxie shot just as well but didn't take as many shots. The Indians swished 2 of 5 from long range for 40 percent, 13 of 22 twopoint attempts for 59 percent and 15 of 27 overall for 56 percent.

From the free throw line, Norton connected on 5 of 7 for 71 percent and Hoxie swished 11 of 17 for 65 percent.

Norton dominated the backboards. The Blue Jays grabbed 12 offensive and 17 defensive caroms for 29 total compared to only 2 offensive and 11 defensive boards for 13 total for Hoxie.

Draper and Brooks led Norton in rebounds with 7 each, followed by Wahlmeier, 5; Lane, 4; Gall, McConney, 2 each; Herman, Nickell, 1 each.

Lane and Brooks each had 3 of Norton's 10 steals. Wahlmeier had 2 thefts while Gall and Nickell each had 1.

The Blue Jays had 16 offensive assists. Lane led with 7, followed by Wahlmeier, Gall, Herman, Brooks, 2 each; Nickell, 1.

Norton had 14 turnovers and Hoxie had 16.

#### Junior varsity

Norton won the junior varsity game by a 19-14 score.

Only one half was played. Jacob Brooks let the Blue Jays in scoring with 7 points, followed by Tye Nickell, 5; Dillon McConney, 4; Luke Ninemire, 3.

Jay Niermeier led Hoxie with 6 points.

### Hamel to play for Hutch juco

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Landon Hamel, outstanding 5'10", 170 pound senior wide receiver and defensive back for the Norton Community High School football team, has signed a letter of intent to play football this fall for Hutchinson Community College.

Hamel is an all-state, all-league performer who lettered three years for coach Lucas Melvin's Blue Jay grid squad. He was a unanimous first team All-Mid-Continent League selection on offense by vote of league coaches this season and on defense he was chosen first team as a kick returner. Hamel was a second team league choice on offense last season.

He was also named to the Class 3A All-State Football Team by the Kansas Football Coaches Association.

Landon was selected to the Super Eleven by the Hays Daily News, to the first team on defense by the Wichita Eagle-Beacon and received honorable mention in the Topeka Capital-Journal at the end of this season.

Despite not playing a running back, Landon was second high in all-purpose yardage for the Blue Jays this season. He had 599 yards on punt returns and kickoff returns, 558 yards on pass receptions and 78 yards rushing for a total of 1,235 yards. Landon scored 8 touchdowns and had 6 pass interceptions. He was second leading tackler for Norton with 85 total stops.

'This is an excellent opportunity for Landon," said Norton head coach Lucas Melvin. "He'll have to earn his way on a team in a tough conference but, if he works hard and gets in the weight room consistently, he will have a good chance to play as a freshman

"If he has two good years with Hutchinson Community College, he can make a jump to a bigger school for his next two years.

"I'm excited for Landon. He'll be representing our Blue Jays, school and community. He has a chance to go outside our area and show how we play football here."

Hutchinson plays in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference, which is considered to be the premier junior college football conference in the nation. The Blue Dragons have been coached the past three years by Rion Rhoades. They have compiled a 7-4 record each of the past two seasons. In 2008, they were Regional runner-up. Last season they defeated Mexico Military Institute in the Salt City Bowl and finished the season ranked No.13 in the nation.

"We are excited to have Landon on board with us," said coach Rhoades. "We will probably play him at defensive back to start. When he visited here, we felt like he was a good fit.

"He comes from a good program in Norton. We've seen him the last two years at our summer camp when coach Melvin brings the players down.

"We feel good about this year's recruiting class. In fact, the last three classes have been good."

The quality of the Hutchinson football program is evidenced by the fact that four of their players from last season have signed to play at Kansas State University. Landon is the son of Melanie Mortensen and Jan Hamel.
