More cuts proposed for schools .

HB 2739, a bill that would change the definition of state financial aid for public schools. The bill will cut millions of dollars from school districts and will require an increase in local mill levies.

Norton Schools Superintendent Greg Mann said \$131 will be cut from base budget, or 3.2 percent. The law would require districts to fund a local foundation budget, meaning 10 percent of the school funding will come from an increase in

Mann said the Kansas Department of Education is predicting the mill levy for Norton Community Schools would increase by 12 mills.

"Based on the Kansas Department of Education projection, the USD 211 mill levy would increase by almost 12 mills, but at the same time USD 211 funds would be flat in 2010/11 and reduced in 2011/12," he said.

In 2009/10, Norton Community Schools' general fund was \$5,106,752. The general fund for 2010/11 is projected

to be \$4,957,830, based on a base-aidper-pupil of \$4,055. The current baseaid is \$4,012, down from the mandated \$4,433. The general fund would be reduced by \$148,922.

Mann said the Legislature is willing to let local boards of education increase the mill levy, while they can say they did not raise taxes.

"The plan as being proposed will mandate local boards of education increasing mill levies in most districts. At election time they will be able to say they (the legislature) did not raise taxes," he said.

The reduction for the general fund is expected to be \$148,922 for 2010/11. \$558,316, or 10 percent of the total amount per pupil, will be put into the foundation fund.

The bill:

Cuts all districts by \$85.9 million, equal to approximately \$131 base budget per pupil, or 3.2 percent. This will lead to further reductions in staff and services to students at a time when educational standards and expectations continue to

Drug investigation ends with two arrests

A six month investigation by the Norton County Sheriff's Department came to an end March 12 with the arrest of two Almena residents.

Norton County Sheriff Troy Thomson said Adam and Charlotte George were arrested after officers found a quarter of a pound of marijuana at their home. Adam was charged with possession of marijuana, sale of marijuana within 1,000 feet of a school, no drug tax stamp and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Charlotte was charged with distribut-

ing certain depressants within 1,000 feet of a school, sale of prescription drugs, possession of marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia, violate control sub-

stance laws via communication facility. Thomson said drug paraphernalia was also seized.

He said Charlotte bonded out on March 14. Adam remains in jail.

Charlotte's preliminary hearing is scheduled for May 14 at 1:30 p.m. Adam's preliminary hearing will be held March 24 at 1 p.m.

"Additional charges may be filed," Thomson said.
