"It might be the oldest building we found," she said.

While most buildings around the courthouse are considered eligible, everything on the west side of State Street is considered ineligible.

Davis said any upgrades since the 1960s would not qualify for the register. She cited metal siding being put on a building in the '80s as an example.

Davis said Dollar General is an example of an ineligible property. She said the Norton centennial book reports this building was

constructed in 1945 and housed several different businesses.

She said it's possible that if the white metal on the upper part of the building were removed and the original materials were undamaged the building could be re-evaluated.

Boxler Insurance Agency, located at 108 N. First, is also an example of an ineligible. Boxler Insurance participated in the Storefront Renewal Program last year and made upgrades to the awning and door.

"Alterations can be very significant in the eyes of the national register," Davis said. Davis took several questions from the audience about what regulations would be placed on properties if they went onto the register. People were concerned about having to follow federal or state guidelines.

"At the end of the day, the feds aren't going to come knock at your door because of what you did to your buildings," she said.

Davis said some things can be debated with the state, such as the importance of a particular building.

"You can argue things. There is negotiation to be had," she said. The complete inventory can be seen at www.khri.kansasgis.org.

Every Census Bureau employee must take an oath and is subject to five years in prison or a \$250,000 fine or both if they disclose any information that could identify you or your household. Your information is only used for statistical purposes.

The 2010 Census is an actual count of everyone living in the United States and is mandated by the U.S. Constitution.

Census data is used to allocate gov/2010census/how

congressional seats to the states and to distribute more than \$400 billion in federal funds to tribal, state and local governments each year.
