Junior/senior prom is set for April 10



Drilling company may be fined

Downing Drilling is over the limits of their contract with the City of Norton for the work at the water treatment plant and could be fined for liquidated damages for being 97 days over contract.

Tom Downing, Downing Drilling, and Chris Miller, Miller and Associates, discussed the issue with the city council on Wednesday.

Miller said Nov. 16 was the completion date, but Downing Drilling was granted a 60 day extension. The project was not complete on Dec. 31, 2009.

"We're 97 days over contract," Miller

"We worked solid through January and February. We want it done right. The only thing I have to offer is December was rough," Downing said.

Downing said the average high in December was 26 degrees.

"The bottom line was the weather. We've been fighting the weather the whole time," he said.

Miller said the bid was awarded Aug. 19 with the notice to proceed given on Sept. 21. Downing said he thinks they started drilling the first week in Oct, saying the delay was due to other projects the company was working on.

Small voter turnout decides Norton city council seats

Elections for the Norton City Council were held on Tuesday with the Norton County Clerk's office reporting unofficial results.

In Norton, three council seats were up for election. In Ward I, Veronica Monier ran against incumbent Jeff Otter. Otter

won with 50 votes while Monier received

In Ward II, incumbent Donna Foley ran unopposed. She received 38 votes.

In Ward III, incumbent Toby Kuhn ran against former councilman Ron Briery and Justina Smith. Kuhn won with 55

votes, Briery received 37 and Smith received 15.

In Ward I, 61 people cast votes out of 663, in Ward II, 37 people cast votes out of 672 and in Ward III, 98 out of 681 people cast votes.

Residents claim property from state treasurer

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State Treasurer Dennis McKinney made a stop in Norton Tuesday morning to visit with several dozen residents about unclaimed property at the Norton County Courthouse.

There is an estimated \$200 million in unclaimed property in the state of Kansas with Norton County having 1,389 unclaimed properties valued at \$142,997.

McKinney said unclaimed property can be claimed through the Treasurer's Web site, www.kansascash.com, or by calling the Treasurer's office at 1-800-432-0386. There is no charge for claiming property.

"It's worthwhile to check and see if you have any unclaimed property," McKin-

Joyce Lofgreen said she stopped to see if she had any property. She learned that her children have some small property

they can claim.

"It was worth my stop," she said. McKinney said several people had small property they could claim, but there

were a couple of residents who were able to claim \$500.

"Most of the ones we found today were smaller," he said.

Unclaimed property includes safe deposit box contents, bank deposits, shares of stock, dividends, mineral royalties, certified checks, drafts or money orders, unclaimed funds held by insurance companies under life and property and casualty policies, utility deposits, property distributable during the voluntary closure (**Property** - Continued on Page 5)
