Miller said Downing asked for an extension in November, which was granted. He asked for a second extension but was denied by Miller and Associates.

"We like to see the project done," Miller said.

He said extensions make the project drag on.

The system was online Feb. 5, 2010, and the only work left is pouring concrete.

Miller said they do not allow concrete to be poured on wet or frozen ground.

"There would have been no way we could have poured concrete after Dec. 3," Downing

Miller said the rest of the work should only take a couple of days, once the ground dries.

Norton City Administrator Rob Lawson said it has been a rough

The council agreed to discuss the issue at the next finance committee meeting, set for April 19 at 5:30 p.m.

In other council business:

• Norton City/County Economic Development Director Diane Stiles proposed a work agreement between the city and county for an inmate work crew. She said the estimated cost is \$45,000, and there

should be 229 working days per year. Stiles proposed splitting the cost between the city and county, with the county paying \$20,000 and getting the inmates for 100 days. The county would also furnish a building where the inmates would be able to work on projects and store their equipment.

Stiles said the county is proposing the old Emergency Medical Services building, located across the street from the hospital. The county is asking for a break on utilities if the inmates would be located there. Half of the building would be used for county storage and half would house the inmates.

Kim Snyder, councilwoman, said it's a great idea. Lawson agreed because it would give the inmates their own space and would limit their contact with city employees.

A motion was made to have city staff review the budget and present options to the finance committee for funding the project. Vote taken, motion passed.

 Stiles also reported the city positions on the economic development board are up. Appointments will need to be made. She said applications can be picked up at the economic development office, 113 N. Norton.

• Mayor David Corns said the car show is requesting some streets be blocked off for the annual car show. He also reported Kyle Jones resigned from the housing authority board. The city will advertise for the position.

• Lawson said John Statton started Monday in the public works department. He said the new refuse truck should be here in three to four weeks, and the Elmwood Park restrooms are finished. He also reported that Dale Henry turned in his resignation from the parks and cemetery department.

Amotion was made to advertise for the position. Vote taken, motion passed.

The panic button at the library

was installed but costs were more than expected. A motion was made to approve the cost of \$271.12, \$45.17 higher than expected. Vote taken, motion passed.

 The Highway 36 Association asked the city for membership, at a cost of \$100. A motion was made to approve the membership. Vote taken, motion passed.

• Lawson discussed the five year plan with the council. It will be discussed at a finance committee meeting at a later date.

• The council discussed the bids for the heating and cooling system for the Recreation Center. The center is waiting to hear about a grant for the unit. A motion was made to table the bids until April 21. Vote taken, motion passed.

• Jeff Otter reported on the last safety committee meeting. Updating ordinances regarding abandoned vehicles was discussed. Otter said they are going to try to make the existing ordinances stick.

 Donna Foley said the utility committee explained sewer billing to a resident during their last meeting.

• Kuhn said the last finance meeting was when the mayor from Atwood presented information about their inmate work crews. He said the meeting went well and was attended by several interested parties.

• Darla Ellis, city clerk, reported on a cereal-malt beverage license that was denied due to the applicant not being a citizen.

The next safety committee meeting will be April 12 at 5:30 p.m., the next utility committee meeting will be April 12 at 6 p.m., the next finance committee meeting will be April 19 at 5:30 p.m. and the next parks committee meeting will be April 26 at 5:30 p.m. at Elmwood Park. (Continued from Page 1) of business associations, property held by courts and public officers and agencies, and miscellaneous property held by one party for another. It does not include land. The treasurer said unclaimed property is typically from some-

one losing or forgetting to cash a check or not notifying their bank when they move. Examples include: payroll checks, refunds and overpayments, money orders, bank accounts, stocks and bonds, safe deposit box contents and insurance proceeds.

He said the Treasurer's office receives 600 safe deposit box contents each year. The contents are held for two years and are

McKinney said the unclaimed property staff has been pushing for more claims and set a record in 2009. They have already passed last year's record. He said they have been pushing harder because the economy has worsened.

"In this economy, everyone could use a little help, and we feel it's important to be sure that these resources get back to the rightful

owners. There are a lot of families out there who need their money," he said. McKinney said there is no

charge to search for unclaimed property on the treasurer's Web site, unlike many Web sites that charge a fee to search.

"We advise people not to pay until they check our site. Our site is free," he said.
