Norton City sets spring cleanup

The City of Norton will conduct their annual Spring Cleanup days April 26, 27 and 28. City trucks will make special trash pick-up on these days. All items must be out at the curb by 8 a.m. on your regular

All types of trash will be picked up on your regular trash route day except yard waste, tires, E-waste and household haz-

Yard waste will be picked up on your regular yard waste route day beginning May 3, and must be in a solid container. There will be a \$10 charge per item for appliances with Freon.

Tree limbs must be cut no longer than 8 feet long. Fireplace ash must be in plastic bags.

The maximum limit the city will pick up at each residence is one load of household items and one load of tree limbs. Normal household trash will be picked up in the usual manner.

Twice-a-week pickup begins the week of May 3. Regular household trash will be picked up on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Yard waste will be picked up on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday, and must be in a solid container. Recyclables will be picked up on Fridays.

Brownback to visit Norton Saturday



Hansen awards scholarships

The Dane G. Hansen foundation of Logan has named 250 high school seniors from 59 Northwest Kansas schools as winners in its 35th annual schol-

arship competition. In addition, 15 scholarships have been awarded to Kansas



Community College students who are planning to continue their education at a Kansas four-year college or university.

Twenty two of the winners are from area high schools. Fourteen students are from Norton Community High School, one from Northern Valley and seven from Logan High School.

In selecting award winners, the scholarship committee considered proficiency in verbal and writing skills. Other important factors are academic records, test scores, and community service in which the student may have participated.

Ten students have won Hansen Leader of Tomorrow scholarships. These awards are for \$5,000 and may be renewable for three additional years.

Renewal of scholarships is based upon continued regard for the principles which guided the success of the late Dane

Preserving America's future

The showing is being sponsored by local citizens concerned about the future of our nation.

"Today, as America teeters on the edge of what many fear may be economic collapse, our children and grandchildren are being sentenced to an unprecedented debt underwritten by China and other entities that do not share the same values and freedoms that we Americans have been privileged to live by," said spokesperson Kathy Wilmot.

Correctional facility class graduated today

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Norton Correctional Facility graduated another group of inmates from a business program this afternoon through a program run by Colby Community College and funded through a \$30,000 KAN-GO grant.

Colby Community College Director of Adult Education Nance Munderloh said the college partnered with Norton Correctional Facility and KansasWorks to offer the educational program to three classes. The program includes courses in business communication, keyboarding, Quickbooks, practical office and customer relations.

The grant has been ongoing, meaning

funds have been dispersed at different times based on the outcome of the program. The first class had 10 students with nine graduating.

"It's an ongoing (grant). We didn't get \$30,000 up front," she said.

The grant covered tuition and books for the students, and it also covered the preparation and testing of inmates who took the WorkKeys test as well as Kansas Workforce's work with the inmates.

Munderloh said the WorkKeys test is used nationwide and tells an employer what level a prospective employee is at.

Before the inmates could enroll in the business program, they had to complete an adult education course.
