Brownback talks state, federal issues

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U.S. Sen. Sam Brownback, the leading candidate in the governor's race, made a campaign stop in Norton on Saturday to discuss state and federal issues with a small group of nine residents at Town and Country Kitchen.

Brownback said Kansas needs to focus on growing its economy and population, not cutting services or raising taxes.

"We've got to get growing. There's

no question about it. I think we've got to focus more on animal agriculture," he said.

He also wants to focus on renewable energy, including wind and ethanol.

"I think it's key we get well-positioned coming out of this recession," he said.

Brownback discussed expanding welfare, saying 40 percent of children nation-wide are born out of wedlock. He said children born to single parents are born into low-income situations where they do not have the same access to education and other services.


He said the best thing for the country is to strengthen families and said expanding welfare benefits to include married couples would help encourage marriage. He said single mothers on welfare are less

likely to get married because they lose benefits for their children. "I'm looking at the macro picture,"

Federal issues were also discussed. Brownback said the government is starting to look more like the European style of government with high taxes and more regulation.

He said the passage of the healthcare bill is evidence of that.

Chiropractic center here changes owners

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Crow Chiropractic changed owners at the beginning of April with Dr. Dustin Cheney, DC, DABCI, taking over the center.

Wes Hall, media representative, said Cheney is a chiropractic internist, meaning he has additional training in diagnosing and treating health problems. Cheney owned three other chiropractic centers prior to taking over the Norton center.

'The reason we're doing this now is because Dr. Crow moved on. We wanted to keep a presence in Norton," he said.

Hall said Cheney specializes in nutrition and chronic conditions, an area that is still exploratory.

"All of our treatments are non-surgical and non-pharmaceutical. We find that a lot of chronic conditions respond to nutritional sensitivities," he said.

Cheney does typical chiropractic practices like spinal correction, but he also works with pediatric care and nutritional testing. Acupuncture is done only at the main office in Phillipsburg.

Hall said right now Cheney is working in Norton Tuesday mornings from 7 a.m.

to 10 a.m. and Thursday afternoons from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. He said they are looking for a full time chiropractor.

"Those hours will change as we find

another doctor and get more people involved," he said. Cheney is from Colby and owns chiro-

practic centers in Phillipsburg, Stockton and Hill City. "His goal is to serve rural communities

out here," Hall said. Cheney said he has wanted to be a

chiropractor since he was a child. "I knew I wanted to be a chiropractor

since I was 14," he said. He grew up in Colby, where he completed two associate degrees at Colby Community College.

He went on to Kansas City to complete a bachelor's of science in human biology, then graduated from Cleveland Chiropractic College as a doctor of chiropractic.

"We've never looked back. It's been a wonderful experience," he said.

Hall said patients can see doctors at the other clinics as well. Dr. Susan Buchanan-Cheney and Dr. Hamed Kian work at the other offices.
