Vehicle tag renewal deadline upcoming

The last day for businesses or persons whose name begins with "E," "F" or "G" to renew automobile, light trucks, motorcycles and/or motorized bikes tags at the Norton County Treasurer's office in Norton will be May 31. When renewing your vehicles remember to include your current proof of insurance. We need to verify the VIN number, policy number and expiration date. In addition to insurance, we need your driver license number or Federal ID number for the business. The Treasurer's office will be closed for the Memorial Day Holiday on May 31.

Driver license renewals can be processed Tuesday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Instructional permits (IP) and Driver Education restricted licenses can be done in the office by appointment only. You will need to bring an original state issued certified birth certificate, social security card for the applicant and a utility bill with current address plus the driver license of the parent that brings the child.

If you have questions, please call the office at (785) 877-5795. All CDL renewals need to be renewed at a full service station in Phillipsburg, Hays or Colby.

Norton City Council meeting, after the council initiated a hiring freeze, 5 percent budget reduction for all city departments and voting not to give cost of living increases to city employees last year.

Jeff Otter, finance committee chairman, said that because the city is paying to hire a Department of Cor-

rections officer to supervise the inmate work crew, the 3 percent cost of living increase should also be given to city employees. He made a motion to initialize the raise on July 1.

Mayor David Corns asked for comments from the council.

Councilman Toby Kuhn said he didn't think it is a

good idea because of budget concerns.

"I'm concerned that the national cost of living in-

crease is zero. It's just my concern," he said.

"I think we need to take care of our employees because they take care of us," Otter said.

The motion failed with Otter and Roberta Ryan voting in favor of it, and Kuhn, Donna Foley and Kim Snyder voting against it.

Residents arrested following investigation

Three Norton residents were arrested last week following a police investigation into an alleged incident involving a 15-year-old girl. J.D. Gall, Matt Stanley and Aaron Husted were arrested after police finished their investigation.

Norton County Prosecutor Doug Sebelius said the alleged incident occurred on April 17.

Gall, 18, was charged with 1 count aggravated indecent liberties with a child, two counts criminal sodomy, one count furnishing alcohol to a minor and two counts conspiracy.

Stanley, 19, was charged with two counts aggravated indecent liberties with a child, 1 count of criminal sodomy, one count of furnishing alcohol to a minor and one

count of conspiracy.

Husted, 20, was charged with two counts aiding and abetting aggravated indecent liberties, one count of aggravated indecent liberties, one count of furnishing alcohol to a minor and one count conspiracy.

Preliminary hearings are scheduled.

Norcatur alumni planning reunion for Memorial Day

ml.olson@nwkansas.com Alumni of Norcatur Rural High School - the last of them graduated 40 years ago – will flock to their old home town on Memorial Day weekend for the alumni banquet, held every five years in the

former school building. The banquet will begin at 6 p.m., Saturday in the Norcatur High School gym, catered by the Norcatur Bar and Grill. Association officers are Beverley Ritter Miller, Norton, president; Joe Dawson, Norcatur, vice president; and Dennis Leichliter, Clayton, secretary-treasurer.

The Norcatur Alumni Association was organized in 1922 to help members keep in touch with "the progress of the school," according to information in the Norcatur Centennial History, edited in 1986 by Ron Temple and Sharon Schulze. Originally, the banquet was held every year to honor the graduating class with appropriate initiation ceremonies. Since the school closed in 1970, five-year banquets have been held.

Fay Betts was toastmaster for the 1931 banquet and Ruth Cleland gave the welcome. Others participating included Ruth Davis, Celia Mavity, Joyce Tolle, Dale Dixon, Oral Brunk, Glenn Deeter, Helen Cleland and Superintendent Forrest Dennen.

Officers elected that year were Marion Ward, president; Helen Cleland, vice president; Delia Mavity, secretary; and Howard Benton, treasurer.

The association became inactive during the depression years of the "Dirty 30s," but in the 1950s, pushed by Patty Eicher Butler, the reunions resumed. In the years before the school closed, average attendance exceeded 400.

The banquet drew a record crowd of 488 in 1970, the last year the high school (**Reunion** - Continued on Page 5)

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
