Results are in for 2010 Walk Kansas event

The 2010 Walk Kansas fitness program, sponsored by Kansas State Research and Extension in most Kansas counties has just been completed.

Here is a summary of the results as they have been turned in to the local extension office:

The latest information turned in state wide is that the Walk Kansas program has grown again.

Over 20,000 people participated in Walk Kansas this year.

In Gove, Sheridan and Trego Counties as well as Twin Creeks Extension District, 72 teams consisting of six individuals participated for a total of approximately 432 participants.

In Norton County, there were 20 teams or 120 participants.

These people have been walking or doing some form of moderate physical exercise and reporting the amounts to the extension office since March 7.

The goal is to walk 423 miles (or the equivalent of walking across Kansas) as a team during the eight week period ending May 1.

Nineteen of the 20 teams reported walking across Kansas.

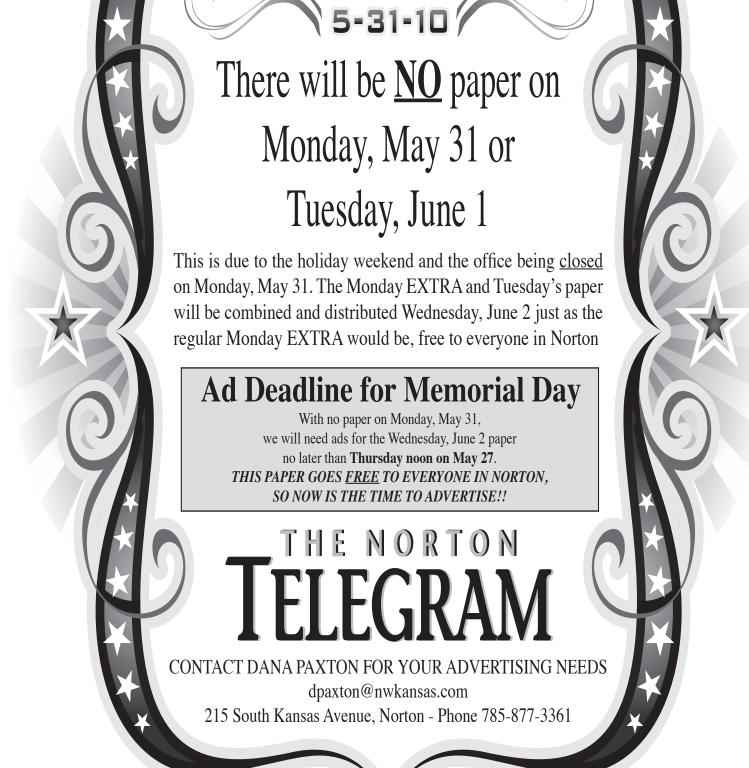
WAKEENEY
