Norton senior sprinter Ashton Draper had the third best time in the 400 meter dash in the preliminaries with a clocking of 51.10, then ran the race in his best time ever to place third and win the bronze medal on Saturday in 50.17 seconds.

Ashton also placed third in the 200 meter dash by running the fourth fastest time on Friday of 23.37 and coming back to run a 23.22 in Saturday's finals.

Ashton also anchored Norton's 4 x 400 meter relay team to a third place finish in 3:30.27. Running with him were sophomore Bryan Henry, freshman Jacob Brooks and junior Billy Broeckelman. On Friday, they qualified for finals with the eighth best time of 3:32.31. Sophomore Tye Nickell was their alternate.

Bryan Henry also qualified in the regional meet for the 400 meters and ran a 52.65 to record the 11th best time.

"Our trip was highlighted by the three medal-winning performances," said coach Jones. "Ashton Draper closed his high school career placing third in the 200 meter dash, running a new personal record time and placing third in the 400 meter dash and running with Bryan Henry, Jacob Brooks and Billy Broeckelman in anchoring the 4 x 400 meter relay team to third place.

"It was nice to see Bryan Henry finish 11th in the 400 meter dash in his first appearance in an individual event at the state meet." GIRLS


Norton senior Alyssa Thomson competed in the high jump


